

#### CLANDESTINE LETTERS.

Our General Delivery Much Abused by Crooks and Others.

The restriction of the "general delivery" system at the postoffices, is one of the matters submitted for the consideration of the Postmaster-General Pelletier.

The "general delivery" in cities where there is a postal delivery i responsible for many evils, which up to the present time the Postal Department have been unable to overcome, but through the efforts of Dommion Inspector George Ross, under instructions of the Postmaster-General, these evils have been reduced

to a minimum in the larger cities. The general delivery is for the purpose of supplying transients with their mail at a convenient place and time, and it was never intended that a resident served with a house delivery should be privileged to secure mail at the general delivery. However, this cannot be avoided, and one of the greatest abuses is the vast amount of landestine mail that passes through the wicket at the "General Delivery of the Toronto Postoffice. The fictitious names are in some instances sufficiently unique to attract attention. and where they are too common there

is many a mix-up. This system is employed by husbands to carry on correspondence with young girls and the wives of ther men. Any person who makes the postoffice one of the sight-seeplaces soon learns to spot the "habiuant' at the wicket. Mrs. So-and-So presents herself at the wicket, and half the time gets her letters without the formality of even asking the name.
