CANADA'S NEED: BETTER ROADS.

T. J. Storey Favors Federal Aid to Highways.

Thomas J. Storey, president and general manager of the Canada Carriage Company, has written for one of the agricultural publications a letter on the question of road improvement. Mr. Storey's business as a manufacturer of carriages gives his views great weight.

He is a pioneer in the manufacture of factory-made vehicles, and has been closely in touch with conditions in the rural districts for almost half a century.

Mr. Storey is an advocate of federal government aid to provincial highways. He thinks that a dominion grant should be made to each province, such grants to be supplemented by provincial money. He suggests that the Dominion government should appoint three practical men who would visit the different provinces, acquaint themselves with the conditions that prevail, and then report to the provincial governments as to the best methods of producing good and permanent roadways.

Mr. Storey contends that Canada has been prodigal in the building of railways while making practically no provision for the construction of highways to feed the railway lines. He points out that "in many instances it costs a farmer to-day as much to draw his produce over twenty miles of Canadian roads as it would to take it 500 miles on a railroad, and it is estimated that it costs three times as much per ton per mile to draw the produce of the farms of this country as it does in Europe."

A GRADUATE OF QUEEN'S

Consecrated for Mission Work in Foreign Field.

Dr. A. A. Gray, a graduate of Queen's, in medicine, last year, was consecrated for missionary work in the foreign field, on Monday evening, at Bonar Presbyterian church, Toronto.

The sending of the young medical man for service in Formosa, which will be his field, is the result of a decision of the Sunday school of Bonar church to support a missionary in the foreign field.

At the farewell services addresses were given by Principal Gendry, of Knox College, Rev. R. P. McKay, Rev. J. P. Robertson, Rev. Dr. Macgillivray, pastor of the church, and the superintendent of the Sunday school.

THE WORST IN THE CITY

Is the Way in Which Citizen Refers to Roadway on Rideau Street.

"Just say for me, that the roadway on Rideau street is the worst in the city," remarked a well-known citizen, who but a moment ago was representative on his rounds to-day.

"What section of the road have you reference to?" asked the reporter.

"Every bit of it," was the reply. "From end to end it is a disgrace, and something should be done to put it into good shape."

City Receives Percentage.
 Montreal, Dec. 3.—The city has just received a cheque for \$409,916 from the Montreal Tramway company, this being the city's percentage on the gross earnings of the railway within the city limits, for the year ending August 31st last.

This seems like a large sum to receive from a single corporation, but it dwindles into insignificance when compared with the sum the city of Toronto received from the Toronto Street Railway company. Payments made to the city of Toronto by that company in its last fiscal year were no less than \$525,000.

SOME NEWSPAPERS REFUSE

To Allow the Dogs of War to be Tied Up.

London, Dec. 3.—Some Austrian and German newspapers refuse to let dogs of war be tied up. The Buda Pest Hirshap-to-day demands that the king of Serbia be compelled to appear before the Austrian officials, should and then to recognize the indignities suffered by the Austrian consul. The Cologne Gazette hears that several Austrian army corps will march into Serbia within a few days.

Crown Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria has arrived at Berlin with the assurance that he will give consideration in the settlement negotiations.

Copenhagen's Model Market.

Copenhagen has a model fish market, built by the municipality. With the exception of the larger varieties, like cod and halibut, all the fish are kept alive in temperature tanks filled with running water. There is no other town where all the fish, whether cheap or dear, are so beautifully fresh.

In the harbor there are a large number of wooden boats piled with holes and filled with fish. These boats float on the surface of the water, and the living fish are taken out of them when wanted. But as every one cannot go to the water's edge to buy fish, there are water tanks on wheels, and the live fish are brought to the doors of the people's houses.—The Argonaut.
