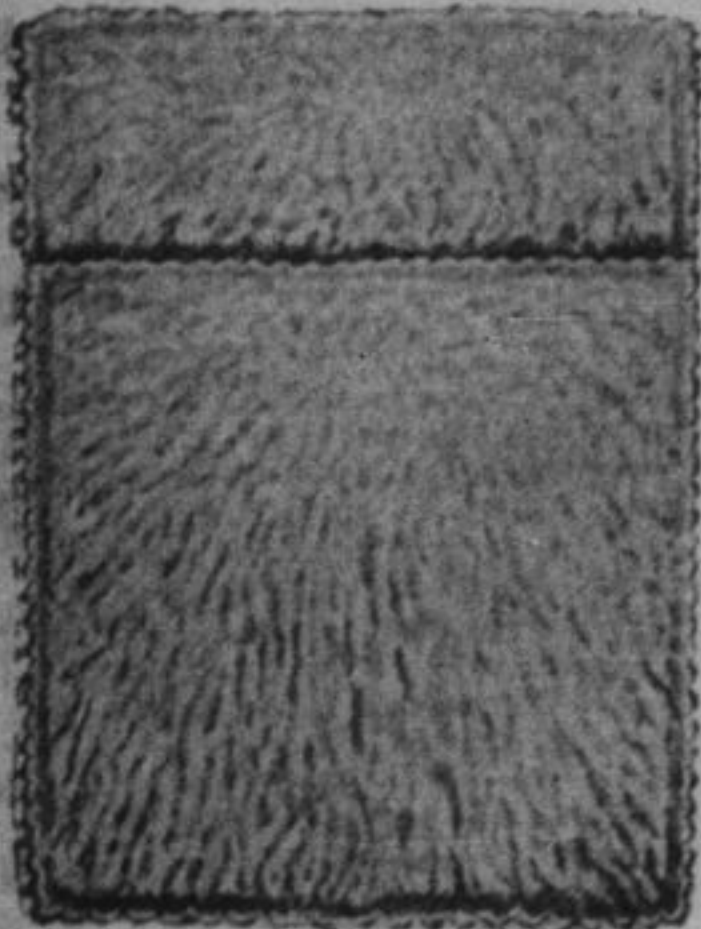

THE CARTAGE RATES.

Local Board of Trade Stand-Behind Recent Resolution.

On Friday, of this week, there will be a conference in Toronto, between the Eastern Canada Board of Trade and the representatives of the Canadian railways, in reference to the proposed increase in cartage rates to shippers. The Canadian Manufacturers Association will also be represented.

The Kingston Board of Trade will not send any delegates to this session. It will be remembered that at a special meeting, held some time ago, a resolution was passed, protesting against the proposed increase in rates, and a copy of the resolution was sent on to the railway commissioners.
