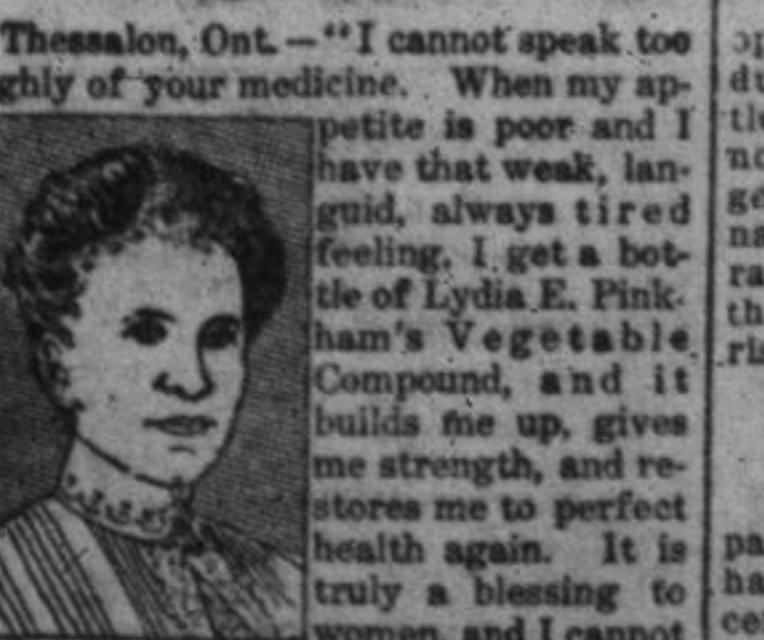

OVERRUN WITH ORDERS

THE DOMINION TEXTILE COMPANY IS VERY BUSY.

Said That Two Bridge Concerns Will Merge—Montreal Men are Doing Well in U.S. Rubber Company. Montreal, Dec. 6.—The Dominion Textile company opened up the month of December with slightly in excess of \$5,000,000 of unfilled orders on its books, as against \$3,750,000 at the corresponding date last year.

It was stated to-day that the orders now on the books of the company are sufficient to keep all mills running to full capacity for almost six months. As one cotton man said, the situation with the Canadian Cotton company at the present time is not one of getting enough business, but rather of being able to turn out orders fast enough to meet the requirements of the trade.

The latest merger talked about on the "street" is that of two bridge concerns, the Dominion and the National. The former is an established concern, while the latter was only organized a few years ago. The union will be on stock exchange basis.

A small number of local interests are doing very well on the steady upward advance in United States Rubber common, the stock getting up as high as 60, a new high level for the movement in Wall street.

Rubber common has changed its position in the New York market during the past couple of years, and whereas it was formerly considered somewhat of a speculative football, it is now classed as an industrial that will show steady advances, notwithstanding the rather heavy capitalization of the company.

W. M. Birks, vice-president of Henry Birks & Sons, and director of Byrie Bros. of Toronto and of the Sun Life Assurance company, has been elected to the board of directors of Molsons Bank. He succeeds the late W. M. Kennedy.

Canadian Companies Increase. Ottawa, Dec. 6.—Company incorporations by federal letters patent increased from 544 to 658 in the last fiscal year, according to the report of the state department tabled by Hon. Mr. Coderre at Ottawa yesterday.

Big Obligations Due. New York, Dec. 6.—Between now and the end of 1913 railroad, industrial and public service corporations will be called upon to meet nearly \$300,000,000 maturing short-term notes. Bulk falls due during first six months of 1913, the big month being June with \$70,000,000. Next is January with \$33,000,000.

Holds 3,553 Shares. Montreal, Dec. 6.—Of the heavy shareholders of the Bank of Montreal, Sir William C. Macdonald heads the list with 5,555 shares of the bank's stock, or equal to nearly 3 1/2 per cent. of the entire issue of stock.

Ready to Rise. New York, Dec. 6.—Professional operators are trying to break the settlement list on the Union Pacific settlement. But "a market that will not break ten points on an European general war scare, radical change of national administration, high money rates and an adverse decision like that of Union Pacific, is ready to rise," says a big operator.
