THE PEOPLE MUST CLEAN SIDE-WALKS OF SNOW.

Poultry Show May be Held in New Armouries—Light Houses to be Kept Lit Until the 15th of December.

Gananoque, Dec. 9.—The funeral of the late James Bolger, who lost his life by drowning on Friday evening last, took place yesterday afternoon at St. John's church, where service was conducted by Rev. F. J. P. Kehoe, and the remains were laid to rest in Gananoque vault. The funeral was largely attended. Gananoque Branch No. 79, C. M. B. A., of which deceased was a member, turned out in a body and a large number of his shop mates from the Steel Company of Canada's works, on River street, also turned out to pay their last respects.

The funeral of the late Alexander White, who passed away on Friday evening last, in the 82nd year of his age, was held yesterday from the residence of his son, Robert White, residing in Pittsburg township, to Gananoque vault, and was largely attended.

William Donohue of Clayton left that village in a launch on Friday morning to come to Gananoque, but getting as far as Grindstone Island, the sea was so heavy to risk further progress, and he had to lay over there until Saturday morning, when the storm had abated sufficiently for him to proceed on his journey.

The town council has taken up the matter of shovelling the walks of the town at the right end this year, and has instructed the local police to enforce the prompt shovelling of the walks within twenty-four hours after a storm, in accordance with the town by-law.

Merrill Belle, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Belle, has been promoted to fill the vacancy on the staff of the local branch of the Merchants bank, occasioned by the promotion of Leslie Sinclair to Edmonton, Alta. Mr. Belle was formerly on the staff of the Belleville branch of that institution.

The government supply boat Scott was in this section during the past few days taking up the buoy marking the steamboat channel. The lighthouse keeper of this section has received instructions to keep the lights burning up to December 15th, or later if the river remains open.

Gananoque Poultry, Pigeon and Pet Stock association has set the date for its winter poultry show, January 28th to 31st. Efforts are being made to secure the new armoury building for the purpose.

CITY HOCKEY LEAGUE MEETING TUESDAY EVENING.

All-Toronto Defeated All-Hamilton at Rugby on Saturday by 30 to 22.—Notes on Hockey, Rugby and Other Sports.

A meeting of the executive of the City Hockey League has been called for Tuesday evening in the Y. M. C. A. building to make arrangements for the winter's sport. Any players who desire entering should have representatives present at this meeting.

No Meeting Resulted. The meeting which was called by the Y.M.C.A. on Saturday to arrange for a hockey team in the city league did not materialize. It is altogether likely that another meeting will be called for some night this week.

In Hockey Circles. Toronto News—Kingston Frontenacs are getting in shape by playing indoor polo. Riddpath and Nicholson might try that on their squads.

If the O.H.A. is satisfied with the line up of the Cleveland and Detroit teams it will not interfere with any teams playing exhibition games in those cities.

Father Stanton, of Ottawa College, has a suggestion to make to the interprovincial hockey league. An arrangement has been entered into between the N.H.A. and the Maritime league to the effect that each may sign any players they desire, regardless of present club affiliations, until January 15th. After that date contracts must be respected.

Basketball Games. In the junior S.S.A.A.A. basketball series, on Saturday afternoon, St. James' and Cooke's met. The game resulted 31 to 13 for St. James', but the game was a great deal closer than the score indicates.

The second game between Srienham and St. John's went to the latter team by default.

Two good games will be played in the senior series on Tuesday evening. Sydenham will meet St. John's and Brock meet Queen.

The annual meeting of the Ontario Rugby Football Union will be held next Saturday afternoon in Toronto, the suspension and proposed expulsion of the Hamilton Alerts, Dominion champions, will be dealt with.
