### COMPANY WILL LOCATE

IN KINGSTON IF A SITE CAN BE SECURED.

Kingston is Likely to Get the Canada Creosote Block Paving Plant—The Company Has Just Been Incorporated.

The Canada Creosote Block Paving company will locate in the northern part of the city, providing that a certain site can be secured and that the government will do the necessary dredging of a channel to their plant.

This is the company with which the Board of Works has been negotiating for some time. Two of its representatives, Messrs. Hardy and E. B. Ryckman, Toronto, met with the Board of Works and the city solicitor, on Friday morning, and made a definite proposition and assurance that the company was desirous of locating in Kingston.

The Allen property, three and a half acres, adjacent to River street, on which the city has an option, and which the company thought for some time would suit its purpose, is now declared to be out of the question. The engineer of the company was in the city early in the week, and after going over it with another representative of the company, Ald. Elliott, chairman of the Board of Works, and the city engineer, made a statement that this property was not suitable. However, the engineer inspected a property, one mile in length, at the property, in the north of the city, and pronounced it to meet the requirements of his company.

Messrs. Hardy and Ryckman, with the Board of Works, on Friday morning, basing their proposal on the advice of their engineer, went over details of their proposition with the city. They explained that this United States concern was incorporated as a Canadian company last Saturday, to be known as the Canada Creosoting company, limited, capitalized with preferred and common stock to the amount of \$800,000. It is absolutely new of its kind in the dominion, and had secured a large contract from the city of Toronto.

They pointed out that to fulfill this and subsequent contracts haste was imperative. They were prepared to expend \$250,000 on the plant at once. But this is all contingent on the city securing an option on the property and inducing the government to do the necessary dredging. W. F. Nickle, M.P., was approached in Ottawa, on Thursday, by a representative of the company, relative to bringing the matter before the minister of public works, and it is understood that the Kingston member could not get a definite answer regarding it from the minister before the end of the week. Mr. Nickle is expected home Friday night or Saturday afternoon, and he will be waited on by the Board of Works regarding the matter.

Mr. Ryckman, who is a son of Rev. Dr. Ryckman, Sydenham street, expressed the belief, with several members of the board, that the govern-

ment would have no objection to meeting the request of the City Council, backed up by the Board of Trade, as it will be. If necessary, a deputation from those bodies will go to Ottawa with representatives of the company to urge the necessity of this dredging upon the department.

Mr. Hardy frankly stated that Kingston was the most favorable site his company had considered, although the directors had many propositions. Midway between Toronto and Montreal, and having secured satisfactory freight arrangements with the railways for handling their lumber and material, the company was desirous of coming to Kingston.

In order that the by-law may be submitted to the ratepayers at the January election, it will have to have its first two readings at Council next Monday evening, and be advertised. Pending the securing of the option on the property, and the assurance of the government that the dredging would be done, it will be prepared to the effect that the city be authorized to purchase this land and guarantee bonds to the extent of \$50,000, with provisos, as to the land and dredging.

Mr. Ryckman explained that the company did not ask the city to guarantee bonds, in order to raise its capital, as that is now on hand. It was for other reasons. The company expects, on the start, to employ between seventy-five and one hundred and fifty men, and to increase its working force considerably from time to time.

The members of the board present were Ald. Elliott (chairman), Fair, Peters, Litton and Hartly.

### RECEIVED A BAD INJURY

While Working at Planer in the Locomotive Works.

Edward Sullivan, formerly a motor-man on the Kingston street railway, was severely crushed by a planer on Thursday afternoon, while at work in the machine shop at the Locomotive Works. He had just taken the place of a new man, on account of the danger of the position, and the table of the planer caught him and gave him a bad jam, before it could be stopped. Had the power not been shut off at the time it was he would have been cut in two. The table caught him at the knee. He was able to move about on Friday with difficulty.

### Young Man Again in Trouble.

A young man recently in police court, charged with appropriating bicycle articles, has been again in trouble. A bicycle disappeared belonging to a young man in the county. After investigation, the owner laid an information with Magistrate George Hunter against the young citizen. A constable arrested him and he was examined by the county magistrate on Thursday. The court was lenient and allowed the prisoner to go, his employer offering to be responsible for the price of the bicycle.

As Storrington is a local option township, the temperance people are going to find out where they obtained the liquor.

### Dr. Cornwall Gets Appointment.

Watertown, N.Y., Dec. 13.—Attorney Raymond Cornwall received word that his cousin, Dr. Leon Cornwall, formerly of Alexandria Bay, had been named as pathologist at the city hospital on Blackwells Island, New York city. The Department of Public Charities requested the appointment of Dr. Cornwall.
