ONTARIO FLOUR CONCERN TAKEN OVER BY BIG CO.

Magnesia Products, Ltd., Will Work Mines on a Big Scale—Familiar Names.

Montreal, Dec. 12.—A special general meeting of the shareholders of the Canadian Cereal and Milling company will be held in Toronto next Saturday, for the purpose of adopting a resolution to wind up the company and to have distributed among the shareholders the consideration received from the Canadian Cereal and Flour Mills, Limited, for the sale of the defunct concern.

Montreal interests have organized the Magnesia Products, Ltd., with a capital of \$800,000, to acquire the Canadian Magnesia, Ltd., the mines and plant of which are located near Calumet, in Argenteau county, and the Magnesia products company of Newark, N. J., the largest manufacturer of magnesia products in the United States.

The new company has been organized with interests identified with the National Bond company of Montreal, and it is stated that it is also the intention of the company to erect a plant in the vicinity of Montreal in the near future.

Among the members of the board of directors are Lt.-Col. Smart, J. R. Colby, Howard Murray, E. L. Bullock and James Ballantyne.

The annual financial statement of the Canadian Car company was issued to-day and shows gross sales of \$16,500,000 and net profits of \$1,040,000. It was also announced that the company has enough work in sight to keep its plants busy for twelve months.

The Williams Mfg. Co., Ltd., has been reorganized with a capital of \$1,000. The company manufactures sewing machines and typewriters and additional capital is being secured in order to permit of extensions being carried out that will result in the company having a much larger output at present. Among the incorporators of the reorganized company are C. W. Davis, B. McLennan, James Rodger, William Yule of Montreal, Charles Tutton and Alexander Langlois of Plattsburg, N. Y.

Financial Notes.

Word has been received from Providence, R. I., that the Grand Trunk railroad has turned down the New Haven railroad's proposal as to traffic agreement.

Robert Anderson of Montreal has been appointed purchasing and sales manager of the Atlantic Sugar industries, Ltd.

The sale of the Bank of New Brunswick to the Bank of Nova Scotia was endorsed by the shareholders at St. John, N. B.

The revenue of the Crystal Springs Land company, Montreal, for the year of 1912 is the largest on record.

W. A. Black, Montreal, has been appointed to the vacancy on the board of the Molson's Bank, created by the resignation of C. B. Gordon.

There is continual offering of U. S. Steel upon all little rallies from "tariff-stricken" holders.

The Teakmanning and Cobalt Mining company have declared a Christmas dividend of three hundred per cent, payable December 20th.

The Canadian Pacific railway earnings for the week ending December 7th were \$2,771,000; increase, \$23,000.

More calling of loans is expected in banking circles. Important sources say the banks have cleaned up industrial loans as never before.

The offering to the shareholders of P. N. Burt company, Limited, of \$545,000, of new, seven per cent, cumulative, convertible, preferred stock has met with an excellent response from the shareholders.

The arrangements now pending for the listing of the securities of the Dominion Bridge company on the Montreal Stock Exchange are attracting more than usual attention, inasmuch as it is believed that such securities would prove very popular with traders and investors.

Coincident with the steady advance in Canada Machinery common to 55, it is stated that early in the new year a dividend at the rate of 5 per cent, will be declared on the stock. It is understood that arrangements are being made now to list Canada Machinery stock in Montreal.

Application will be made at the present session of parliament to incorporate the German-Canadian Trust company. From what can be seen at the moment Ottawa interests are behind the company.

The Shawinigan Water and Power company have authorized the issuance of the \$500,000 consolidated mortgage debenture 4 1/2 per cent, stock.

A New York exchange seat has been sold for \$58,000, the lowest figure since 1897 and the share has risen in more than four years.

The Quebec Railway, Light and Power company may ask the government to guarantee the interest of the bonds of the Quebec and Saguenay railway.

In banking circles one of the apparently soundest reasons advanced for the calling off of the negotiations between the Home and International banks, looking to the absorption of the latter, is that the Home bank did not wish to become entangled in the litigation that is going on between the International and some of its shareholders.

The Gould Manufacturing company has declared a dividend of one and a half per cent, and preferred, one and three-quarters per cent, payable January 2, 1913, to shareholders of record December 20th, 1912.

President Mellen of the New Haven railroad asks permission to testify before the federal grand jury in the matter of Grand Trunk-New Haven traffic alliance.

The Crown Reserve Mining company has declared a 2 per cent, dividend and a bonus of 3 per cent, payable January 15th to shareholders of record December 31st, 1912.

Northwestern bankers are optimistic over the outlook, and predict that conditions in 1913 will be as prosperous or more so than in 1912.

The statement of the New York Copper Producers' association for November shows an increase in stocks on hand of \$9,419,095 pounds, compared with the previous month.

J. Stuart McQuig, son of Colin M. McQuig, has been elected a member of the Montreal Stock Exchange.

The directors of Canadian Westinghouse, Toronto, have declared the regular quarterly dividend of 1 3/4 per cent, and with it a bonus of 2 per cent, bringing the total distribution to shareholders for the year up to 9 per cent.

SCHWAB TO AID EX-CONVICTS

Steel King Offers Employment to Short-term Men.

Bethlehem Pa., Dec. 13.—Charles M. Schwab has come forward with an offer to aid all prisoners released from the Bucks county jail.

Charles M. Meredith, sheriff of Bucks county, two weeks ago publicly announced that he would try to place in good positions the men released from the Bucks county prison at Doylestown if they had served short term sentences.

Mr. Schwab inquired about the men. Sheriff Meredith answered it and yesterday received an inquiry from the Bethlehem Steel company.

Mr. Schwab's corporation, asking whether it would be possible to obtain the services of 100 men at once, and offering regular employment in the coke department to those released in the future at wages ranging from 17 1/2 cents an hour to 21 cents an hour.

"RED LIGHTERS" MUST GO.

Chief of Police at Lethbridge Issues the Order.

Lethbridge, Alta., Dec. 13.—Over two thousand dollars was collected in fines in the police court here as the result of a raid made on the segregated area in this city. Chief of Police Bevis (formerly of Toronto) has notified every keeper of a disorderly house to vacate this city by December 31, which means the extermination of the "red light district." Over forty cases were disposed of, and the court was crowded to capacity by curious spectators.

WILL HAVE IT'S CHANCE.

Sir Edward Grey Reaffirms His Views on Female Suffrage.

London, Dec. 13.—Sir Edward Grey, secretary for foreign affairs, in a letter which was read at a suffrage meeting here, reaffirmed that woman suffrage would have its chance in the government reform bill. If parliament adopted the suffrage amendment, he declared, the government would loyally support it, although the ministers were divided on the subject.

Wife Objected to Being "Horse."

Lisbon, Ohio, Dec. 12.—Because she had been used as the "off horse" hitched to a plow with her brother, Walter Yeager, Mrs. Emma Zimmerman, aged twenty-three, was granted a divorce by Judge Moore from her husband, Jacob Zimmerman. According to the testimony given, Zimmerman hitched his wife and her brother, Walter Yeager, aged twenty-one, to a plow and drove them like a team of oxen over his fields.

LAWER OFFERED WIFE

\$50,000 To Go To Reno And Divorce Him.

New York, Dec. 13.—August Zinsner, Jr., a lawyer and president of the Yorkville bank, is accused by his wife of offering her \$50,000 if she would go to Reno and divorce him and give him the custody of their children.

Mrs. Zinsner filed suit in the Supreme court against her husband and former assistant District Attorney Garvin as trustee of a separation agreement made by the Zinsners in 1908.

Mrs. Zinsner alleges that several years after their marriage in 1895 her husband treated her with cruelty, insolence and indifference, and that her relations with her husband became so unbearable, that he suggested that she get a Reno divorce, out she rejected his offer of \$50,000, if she would get the divorce and give him the children. Then he told her that if she would agree to a separation she would get an allowance of \$3,000 a year and if she did not consent she would get nothing. She accepted, this offer without having a chance to consult a lawyer and without realizing the increase in the cost of living.

\$300,000 FOR ACTRESS.

Will of Aviator Arley Leaves Estate to His Widow.

London, Dec. 13.—The will of Henry J. Delaval Arley, the aviator, who was killed at Belfast on Sept. 21st, showed that he left an estate valued at \$25,000. All of this goes to his widow, who was formerly Miss Winder, an American musical comedy actress, except \$20,000, which is bequeathed to relatives of the testator.

Mr. Arley, who was but twenty-four years of age when he was killed, took up aviation as a pastime. He was the eldest son of Lady Florence Heathcote-Drummond-Wiloughby, who was the third daughter of the Marquis of Conyngham.

Angelo Barrusso, aged forty years a miner of Pitston, Pa., was arrested at Buffalo, N.Y., on a warrant charging first degree murder. Four years ago in a fight in a mine at Pitston, Barrusso is alleged to have shot dead, Peter Colicoria and Joseph Lantini, miners.

The Krupp Gun Works of Berlin, show a surplus for the year, of \$12,500,000, arising largely from the demand for guns caused by the Balkan and Terko-Italian wars.
