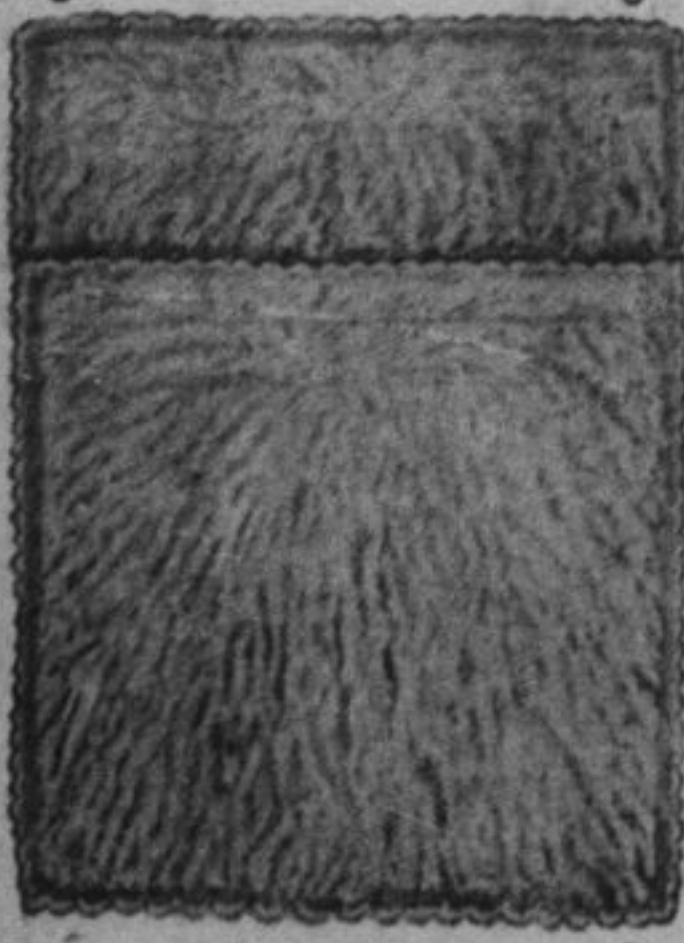

REV. T. W. SAVARY, M.A.

WAS APPOINTED RECTOR OF ST. JAMES' CHURCH.

The Congregation's Wish Accorded to by the Bishop of Ontario, Who Was Waited Upon While the Meeting Was in Progress.

Rev. T. W. Savary, for nearly four years vicar of St. James' church, was, on Monday night, appointed rector of the parish by the Bishop of Ontario, in succession to the late Archdeacon J. K. Macmorine.

A largely attended meeting of the parishioners was held in the evening for the purpose of carrying out the conditions of the canon in regard to the appointment of the rector. The following were appointed the committee to submit three names to the bishop:—Francis King, Frederick Welch, G. E. Hague, H. H. Taylor, J. R. Forster. The names suggested were Rev. T. W. Savary, Rev. Prof. Cotton, of Wycliffe College, Toronto, and Rev. A. H. Sovereign, of Vancouver, B.C. The latter held the curacy of the parish some years ago.

As an evidence of the will of the parish a unanimous standing vote of the meeting was taken in favor of Mr. Savary.

From the meeting, the committee went to "Bishopcourt" and submitted the names to the bishop. In addition the members mentioned the unanimous wish of the parishioners in favor of the new rector. Without any hesitancy the bishop appointed Mr. Savary, and instructed the committee to acquaint Mr. Savary of the same. This it did immediately.

Rev. T. W. Savary took charge of the incumbency in February, 1909. For three years, 1901-2-3, he served as curate of St. James' and was afterwards rector of St. Luke's church, Winnipeg. He came to

Kingston from that charge. Since the death of the late Archdeacon Macmorine it has been proposed and settled to go ahead with the building of the much-talked-of Sunday school and parish hall. Subscriptions have been collected for its erection, and a draft of the plans has been prepared. It is proposed to call the building the "Memorial Hall" to perpetuate the memory of the late priest. A large Sunday school hall and auditorium, with adjoining class room, will likely be the lay-out of the second floor, and the young men's club and the various other activities of the parish will be accommodated on the ground floor. The building will be on the grounds adjacent to the church.

AT THE GRAND.

Fritz Scheff in "The Love Wager," Monday Night.

"The Love Wager," a new operetta, in which Fritz Scheff is starring this season, was presented at the Grand last night, and provided a fine treat. The company played to a very large audience. The production is one adapted from the Hungarian play "Seven Sisters," and centres around the seven daughters of Mrs. Gyurkovics, widow of a Hungarian army officer. Count Feri Horkey makes a wager, for three kisses, with the fourth daughter, Miti (Fritz Scheff) that he will bring about the marriage of three daughters inside of a year. He fills the bill as a matrimonial agent, with honors, and finally wins Miti as his own wife. The events which lead up to the several knots being tied, provide a unique entertainment. As Count Horkey, George Anderson played his part exceedingly well. Both he and the star responded to many curtain calls. There was a very strong supporting company, and a special feature was the dancing. The music was played by the company's own orchestra. "A Bachelor Song," rendered by Horkey made the hit of the evening. The production was given a rich staging, and with the costumes, provided a fine display. The male chorus of Hussars was good.

THE ANCHOR WAS RAISED

It Was Found Caught on the Water-works Intake Pipe.

The anchor which the schooner Major Ferry dropped on the water works intake pipe about two months ago was located and raised by the Donnelly Wrecking company on Monday afternoon.

The schooner was coming into the water works wharf with a load of coal at the time. In a storm the anchor was lowered but when it was suspected that it was on the intake pipe the captain dropped it. With the recent precautions regarding the purity of the city water it had been asked if the pipe had not been punctured by the anchor.

"Sandy" Tait, the experienced diver of the Donnelly company, examined the pipe thoroughly and reported to C. C. Folger, general manager of civic utilities, who was on the job, that it was intact. The pipe is embedded in mud. The anchor was caught on it.

LATE MRS. GEORGE WALDREN.

A Well-known Kingston Lady Died in Guelph.

The death occurred in Guelph on Monday morning of one of Kingston's oldest residents in the person of Mrs. George Waldren, wife of the late George Waldren of this city. She was born seventy-three years ago. Her maiden name was Jean Mitchell. Her late husband was foreman in the Bailey broom factory, and once a member of the Board of Education. Mrs. Waldren leaves two daughters, and four sons, George, New Glasgow, N.S.; Dr. Harry, in the west; Thomas and William, S. Bailey and Mrs. Gould, of this city are nephew and niece of the deceased. Mrs. Waldren was a member of Queen street Methodist church. During the last few years she lived with her brother, Robert Mitchell.

The remains arrived in the city on Tuesday afternoon on the Grand Trunk train and the funeral took place to Catawago cemetery.

The Late Mrs. O'Hara.

The death occurred on Tuesday morning at her late residence, 67 Arch street, of Mrs. Emma O'Hara, wife of George O'Hara. The deceased lady was thirty-five years of age. She had been ailing for three months and death came as a relief. She was an Anglican in religion. The funeral will take place on Thursday morning.

EIGHTEEN NEW DWELLINGS

To be Erected on Ellerbeck Street Next Year.

Evidence of Kingston's progress are cropping up every day. The latest is a project promoted by J. O. Hutton, James Hedden and Dr. A. E. Ross, to build eighteen new dwelling houses on Ellerbeck street next spring. The houses will cost about \$3,000 each, and will vary in design and construction so as to give each individuality. They will all be single dwellings and will be near the car line.

The labor people, however, have not given up and will be out at the earliest possible moment with a full slate of candidates for all the wards in the city.
