Canada's premier lumberman is R. Booth, Among the friends Booth there is a question whether he made a fortune in lumber or in railroading, but it is the general belief that his estate is about equally indebted to these two sources of re-

Booth was born in Ottawa, Canada, in 1841. His father was possessed of more than the average means, but ! before his death, which occurred when the present head of the family was a boy of fifteen years, he lost all of his money, and thus compelled his !

son to depend upon himself. This enforced independence brought [out all there was in him. He saved and worked, worked and saved, and [at a comparatively early age built a lumber trust on the old-fashioned lines from a tiny sawmill on the Ottawa ! River. He did not capitalize, but paid hard cash for all that

His first hig stroke in the world of finance was when he bought the Canada Atlantic railroad, an indifferent sort of institution, with few visible assets and fewer prospects. Booth was not dismayed by the handicaps the project offered, but set about his task with the confidence ! and deterination that have been his hief characteristics. The road extended from Montreal to Parry and covered a distance of

aboat 450 miles. Booth had no associates in this deal. Out of his lumber earnings, which had been reasonably large up to that time, considering the day and age, he attacked railroading on his own responsibility. Analyzing the situation with his peculiarly analytical mind, he put the railroad's stock in a vault in the Ottawar banks. He was peering into the future when the Grand Trunk railroad. then a struggling organization, would os compelled to buy him out. kept the railroad stock in the bank, unpledged, for five years, when the Grand Trunk first made overtures for their purchase at a price many hundred times in excess of

Booth had paid for them. No one knows how much Booth made on this deal, but it is believed | that the amount gave him his long! waited for boost toward great wealth. He is now one of the directors of the Grand Trunk Raildevoted to a chain of lumber mills S located for the most part in Canada.
