**ADDRESS ON LABRADOR**

BY MAJOR D. I. V. EATON, OF THE R.C.M.A.

Who Accompanied Dr. A. P. Lowe in an Exploration Trip—The Expedition Succeeded Because it Was Well Organized.

Major D. I. V. Eaton, of this city, addressed the Historical Society on Wednesday evening on "Labrador." He supposed the old boundary of Labrador to be the natural and, and he included in his talk that immense territory which he had assisted Dr. A. P. Lowe in exploring. He described the immense exploration trip in which Dr. Lowe and himself had travelled 5,400 miles through that wild and neglected country. Of this distance they made 2,900 miles in canoes, 1,000 miles on foot, 500 miles with dog teams and the balance of the distance by sea.

Major Eaton gave glowing details of that expedition, which succeeded owing, to a large extent, to splendid organization. Many such expeditions he said, had failed owing to lack of knowledge in woodcraft. He told also of the great timber lands and also of large areas of arable land, of the finding of the Grand Falls, where the river dropped 800 feet in eight miles. Two miles above the Grand Falls the river is two miles wide. This stretch of water concentrates and throws its entire volume over a 300-foot precipice, between banks only 100 yards in width. This gives the water great force and it shoots out into the air and falls at an angle of 45 degrees.

These falls are higher than those of Niagara, but the body of water is not so great.

Major Eaton drew attention to the fact that large areas of wood land were destroyed every year owing to lack of fire protection. The land was rich in gold and iron, timber and furs. He also held that there was about 1,000 square miles of arable land. It is neglected rather than desolate, and only lacks people and railways to develop it.

Professor Gwillim, who also has been in Labrador, moved a vote of thanks to Major Eaton, which was seconded by Major Sedgwick, and carried.

**ASSOCIATED CHARITIES**

**Hope That Churches Will Not Overlap in Giving Aid.**

The Board of Associated Charities met on Wednesday afternoon with Dr. A. E. Ross in the chair. J. C. McConachie was present and formally announced that Rev. A. E. Smart would, in his absence take over his work in connection with the Children's Aid Society.

The meeting received the resignation of Robert Meek from membership of the Board of Associated Charities. Mr. Meek's services were valued and the meeting held the communication over to ask Mr. Meek to reconsider his decision.

The hope was expressed that all of the churches would unite in their efforts to distribute charity into its proper channels and all who gave charity would consult the general secretary as to prevent overlapping. The new office of the general secretary is at 253 King street. The meeting was adjourned until the second Thursday in January.

**MUST CARE FOR HORSES.**

Drivers Who Ill-Treat Animals Will Have Trouble.

Acting for the Humane Society, Constable Samuel Arniel made a trip over to Barfield and investigated a case in which it was alleged that a driver had been driving a horse with a very lame leg. The owner was notified that if he ill-treated the horse he would be summoned before the magistrate. Constable Arniel keeps a watchful eye on the horses around the city, to see just how they are used. There are a few drivers in the city who will have trouble if they do not stop beating their horses. Thursday morning a driver on Ontario street was noticed to give his team a lash with a whip when it was not at all necessary, as the team had an extra load, and both were pulling for all they were worth.
