SIX CHILDREN TAKEN

AS WARDS OF THE CHILDREN'S AID SOCIETY
Arrived Here From Bathurst Township—Widowed Father Left Children With Neighbors to Go Out and Seek Work.

A pitiful case of child neglect was given attention by Rev. A. E. Smart, of the local Children's Aid Society, at Clarendon Station on Friday. The children lost their mother about two months ago, and their home in Bathurst township fell into ruin and became destitute through the shiftlessness of their father. The man, Andrew McCoy was refused aid by the reeve of the township, and leaving the children with neighbors, he went away to work in the lumber camps.

Rev. Mr. Smart notified of the case and before Justice Magistrate Smith of Sharbot Lake, on Friday, the destitute children, six in all, were made wards of the Children's Aid Society. On Friday afternoon one of the girls was sent to the shelter at Brockville in charge of Rev. D. Stovo, of Smith's Falls. There are three girls, Lizzie, Maggie, and Mary Ellen, and three boys, Russell, Joseph and Henry. The children were in a very destitute condition and will be taken to the children's shelter at Brockville before being placed out in homes. One of the amusing incidents in their story was the astonishment with which they regarded the train which they saw for the first time. They called them "houses jammed together."
