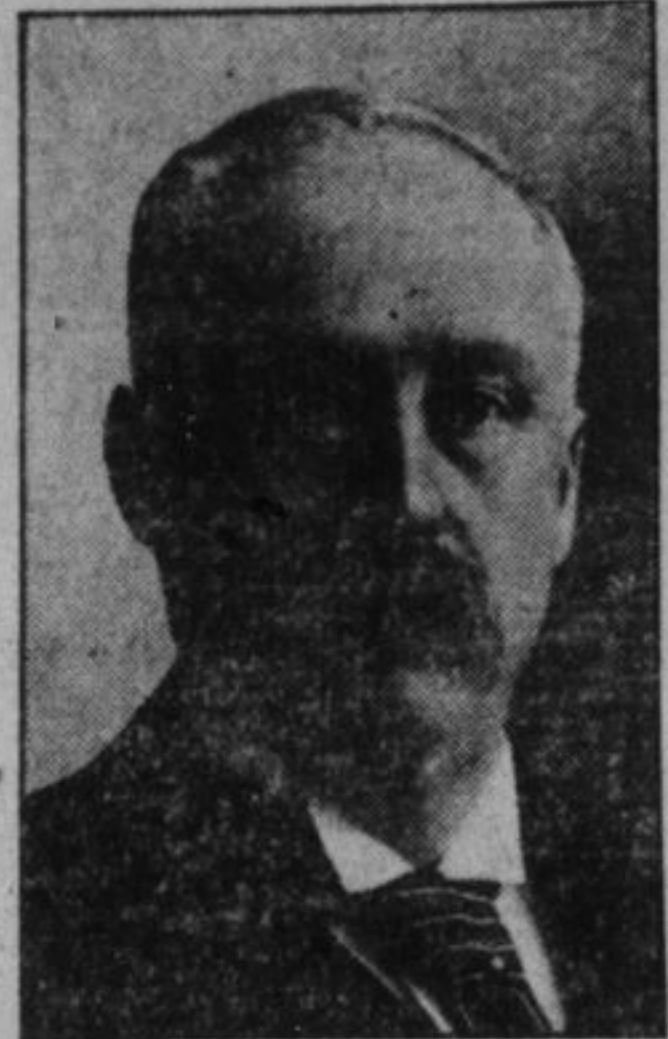
PRESENT A GOLD WATCH TO DR. WILLIAM SPANKIE.

The Retiring School Inspector—An Address Was Read by J. D. Cosgrove, of Wolfe Island.

On Saturday afternoon, at 1.30 o'clock, in the court house, an event, the recollection of which will long linger with those present, took place. To mark the retirement of Dr. William Spankie, as inspector of public schools for the county of Frontenac, and their esteem for that official, the teachers gathered, read an address, and made a suitable presentation.

Miss E. M. Pyke, of Wolfe Island, president of the Frontenac Teachers' Association, presided. Letters of regret at inability to be present were received from a number, among them S. A. Truscott, of Iroquois, Dr. Spankie's successor, and M. R. Reid, of Sharbot Lake, inspector of North Frontenac.

J. D. Cosgrove, of Wolfe Island, read the address, and Mrs. S. Revelle, of this city, made the presentation. The address, which was signed, on behalf of the teachers and ex-teachers of the county, by Miss E. M. Pyke,

of Wolfe Island; Mrs. S. Revelle and Miss G. Jones, of Kingston; Miss A. Anglin, of Kingston Mills; Miss S. Wood, of Iroquois; and J. D. Cosgrove, of Wolfe Island, was as follows:

"To Dr. W. Spankie, I.P.S.: We, the teachers and ex-teachers of the historic county of Frontenac, having learned with deep regret of your resignation as public school inspector, which office you have filled so ably and well for more than a quarter of a century, feel that we cannot let you depart from the office without some acknowledgment on our part of the many acts of kindness you have bestowed upon us during your long term of office.

"We rejoice in having had one so talented and benign as you to fill such an important office. Your visits to the schools were ever a source of pleasure to both teacher and pupil. Your great sympathy with and your interest in the teachers of the county, have produced that harmony so essential to the advancement of education.

"The new schoolhouses that have been built, the libraries that have been installed, and the splendid equipment of the schools throughout the county, show very conclusively the deep interest you have taken in educational matters.

"Frontenac is indeed proud of her many noted educational men, but none does she cherish more than you, who have proved yourself to be not only one of the leading educationists of the county but of the province.

"As a slight token of the esteem in which you are held by the teachers and ex-teachers of Frontenac, we ask you to accept this watch. We trust you will think not of its intrinsic value, but of the feeling which prompts the giving, and our supplications shall be that you be given health and strength to enjoy our gift for many years to come."

Dr. Spankie suitably and feelingly replied, expressing his gratitude for the kind words and gift, coming from those whose relations with himself had been most cordial.

The watch was handsome in workmanship, and suitably engraved. The presentation was followed with a social time, with refreshments.
