## IN SPORTING CIRCLES

### ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE IS TO REPLACE

Ottawa College in Inter-Collegiate Senior Rugby Series—Some Changes Made in Counting Points For a Try.

Royal Military College of Kingston after winning the intermediate championship of the Intercollegiate Rugby Union for four seasons were admitted to the senior series on Saturday at the annual meeting of the governing body of college rugby in Montreal and will next fall figure in the schedule against McGill, Queen's and Toronto Varsity. The cadets have long since proven themselves worthy of a place in the senior ranks and through the resignation of Ottawa College, who were not invited to return to the fold, a place was made for the Kingston team. The junior series of the union was also extended and St. Michael's College of Toronto was admitted to membership for the first time.

The season of 1913 will not open until later in October, the opening games being set for a week later than this year. The opening matches to be played on Saturday, October 11th with Queen's at McGill and Toronto at the Royal Military College.

The session was a lengthy one due to the numerous amendments which came up for discussion. The majority of these were defeated while some important ones were passed which in the opinion of the delegates will benefit the game greatly.

That points must be earned is made evident by the adoption of an amendment to the counting of points. Hereafter a try secured by a team through the fumbling of the opposing backs will only count three points, while a try secured by a player carrying the ball over his opponents' line shall count five with the addition of another point for a converted goal. In past seasons substitutes were allowed only in case of injury while in future they may be put in at any time which will go to make the game faster as it will keep the teams supplied with fresh players throughout the playing periods.

Probably the greatest surprise came in the adoption of the amendment to allow a player five yards to make a fair catch from a kick, in place of three yards as has been the rule for the past three seasons. If a player commits a foul within his opponents' line there shall be no score as the result of it and the ball will be scrimmaged by the offending side five yards out from the goal. The McGill delegates advanced several good arguments in favor of having the ball snapped back from a scrimmage in place of heeling it out, but this amendment met with little favor in the opinions of the other delegates, due to the fact that in adopting this rule the two side scrimmage men would have to be dropped.

Outside interference was more explicitly defined at the request of Queen's club, and in future a player on the line will be enabled to advance two yards in making a hole in the opposing line for a back.

A committee to take charge of the senior division was appointed, consisting of Graham Ross, McGill; Lindsay Malcolm, of Queen's and "Jack" Maynard, of Varsity as secretary. The following officers were elected: Honorary President—Colonel J. H. V. Crowe, R.M.C.; President—George Laing, McGill; First vice president—Professor J. E. Macdonald, Queen's; Second vice president—J. C. Maynard, Toronto University; Honorary secretary treasurer—N. H. Macaulay, R.M.C.

Delegates present at the meeting were: McGill, McEwen and Lee, (by proxy); Queen's, K. McKay and Ken Williams; University of Toronto, G. Taylor, R. Grass and R. Thompson; Royal Military College, N. H. Macaulay; Kingston College Institute, E. O. Sitter; Ontario Agricultural College, T. H. Gandier. Ottawa College was not represented.

### THE CARTWRIGHT ESTATE.

Some Details of the Assets and the Liabilities.

The will of the late Sir Richard J. Cartwright was made on October 18th, 1907, but a codicil was added on July 2nd, 1912.

A statement submitted by the executors shows what goes to make up the \$238,393 total value of the estate, against which there are debts to the extent of about \$150,000.

Some of the main items going to make up the \$238,393 are moneys secured by mortgages, \$81,466.66; by bank and other stocks, \$63,799.27; cash in the Bank of British North America at Ottawa, \$24,278.12; cash in the Bank of Montreal at Ottawa, \$188.09; from other personal properties, \$26,389.76; real estate, \$28,880.

The statement, signed by Alexander Dobbs Cartwright, Ottawa, and Richard Conway Cartwright, Napanee sons and executors.

Of the real estate that the deceased statesman owned, some was in the vicinity of Napanee. Details are set down of seventeen acres of land in Fredericksburg township near Napanee, said to have a market value of \$4,000; one on Davidson and Richard streets, Napanee, worth \$2,500; and some in the counties of Lennox and Addington, worth \$2,000, \$9,000, and \$5,000, respectively.

### FIRE CAR PRINCIPLES.

Strength, Power and Speed Are The Essentials.

In the application of the motor-car to fire service, the period of experimenting and development has passed and radical changes in design are not to be expected. Three broad principles have been established—strength, power, and speed. A fire-car must withstand very short but terrifically hard runs. It must have sufficient power to overcome every obstacle in the shortest possible time, climb all grades, and travel through all conditions of mud and snow.

The pleasure car is not built to overcome or meet such contingencies, and the motor driven apparatus must be balanced and have such weight that it will handle successfully on sharp curves, hills, and advances and meet every condition of traffic or street surface. A very low centre of gravity, broad gauge, or tread are necessary, requirements for the safety of men and car.—Adv't.
