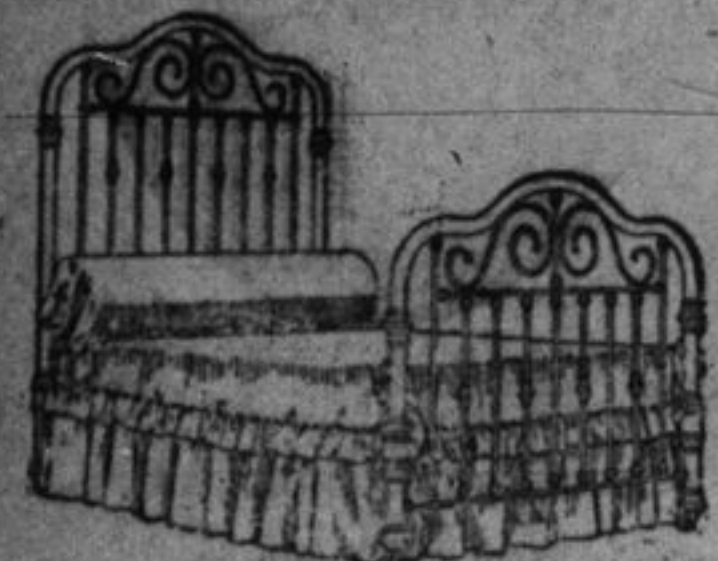

THEY THREW HIM DOWN

BECAUSE POLITICAL SCREWS WERE PUT ON THEM

By Conservative Bosses Who Had the Power to Dictate—Ald. Bailey Makes a Statement.

After a survey of Monday's election, Ald. S. R. Bailey has come to the conclusion that some support that was pledged to him at the beginning slipped away because political screws were put on in several places by heads of the conservative party, who were in a position to dictate. The vote was well broken up throughout the city, but a few conservatives who had intended doing some work for him, were drawn off. One of his leading supporters originally, who was to have been a strength to him in Victoria ward, was not "on deck," and his dropping out meant, probably a loss of fifty votes, which were not gathered in. It was quite a shock to Ald. Bailey to think that he had thus been "thrown down" by a friend.

He is thankful to Rideau ward electors for the way they stood by him. The vote up there, he says, shows that Mayor Hoag does not own that ward. When asked if he intended taking action regarding the circular of Mayor-elect Higney, issued last Saturday evening, in which the latter intimated that the rookback was apparently issued with the sanction and knowledge of his opponent, Ald. Bailey said that the election was now over, and he would let the matter drop. No responsible persons, he said, believed for a moment that he knew anything of the issuing of the rookback. In fact, it was generally blamed upon his opponents, and a number of people had voted for him in consequence.

LOCAL OPTION RESULTS.

How the Vote Stood at the Several Places.

- The results of local option contests in this district were:
- Renfrew—Local option repeal vote defeated here, 110 majority.
- Pinch—Local option sustained.
- Troquois—Local option carried by an increased majority of 157 for, to 79 against.
- Pembroke—Local option was defeated on straight vote by 182.
- Almonte—Local option was sustained to-day, despite a force opposition, by a vote of 232 to 265.
- Carleton Place—Local option resulted, for the by-law 230; against the by-law, 391.
- Newboro—Local option wins by a majority of 12 over a three-fifths vote.
- Eganville—Local option by-law defeated, 148 against, to 54 for.
- Peterboro—Local option defeated by 125 on three-fifths vote.

DIVISION COURT CASES.

Cabman Failed to Appear Against a Queen's Student.

The recent attitude of the students with the local cab men regarding dances, culminated in legal proceedings. On Tuesday morning, in the division court, Judge Madley of Napanee, settled a case, which, owing to the action of one of the principals, was of brief duration. A case had been entered by a cab driver against a student for fare to the amount of \$2. When called, the plaintiff was not present, therefore withdrawing the case. The defendant had deposited \$2 with the court for the fare. The judge dismissed the case, the plaintiff having to pay the costs, above the \$2.

The docket disposed of by the judge in division court was very large, and the sitting was not finished until late in the afternoon. There were over forty cases, and fifteen judgment summonses.

In one, Thomas Evans sued R. E. Harpell for an account of \$100, arising from a horse that had been purchased. J. L. Whiting, K.C., appeared for the plaintiff and W. F. Nickle, K.C., defended Harpell. Judgment was given for Evans for \$100, less a counter claim of \$9.

DAIRYMEN'S CONVENTION.

Will Open in This City on Wednesday Morning.

The thirty-sixth annual convention of the Eastern Ontario Dairymen's Association will open in the City Hall on Wednesday, and for three days, Kingston will be the headquarters of many of the prominent dairymen of the country. Quite a large number of delegates arrived in the city to-day to attend the convention.

Wednesday will be regarded as farmers' day. At the opening an address will be given by the acting president, G. A. Gillespie, after which committees will be appointed. Dr. J. W. Edwards, M.P., and Anthony Rankin, M.P.P., are down on the programme for addresses. Prominent speakers on dairymen from different parts will be present.

The Wednesday evening session will take the form of a citizens' meeting. Hon. Senator Bechyshire will take the chair, and Mayor Hoag will deliver an address of welcome to the delegates.
