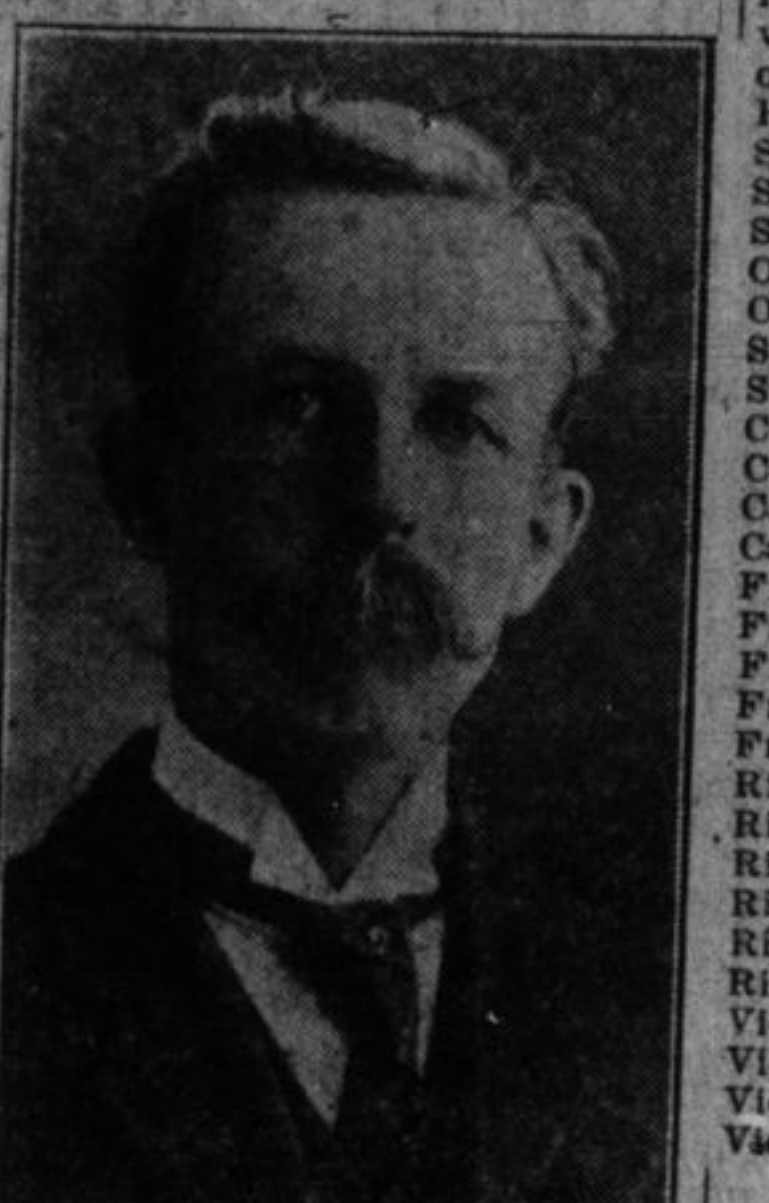

ALDERMANIC CONTESTS

Notes on the Council. The council of 1913 has three good songsters in Daniel Couper, 'Nick' O'Connor and G. H. Gillespie. Politically, the council consists of eleven Tories and eleven Grays. With such a fair division there should be no politics. There were 3,230 votes cast for the mayoralty, just 96 more than in the McKay-Graham election two years ago. In the new council are eight Anglicans, five Presbyterians, four Roman Catholics, three Methodists and two Baptists.

Wright, the labor candidate in Cataragui ward, winning easily in Rideau ward, James A. Bews, the labor candidate, nosed out a victory in the contest with Ald. R. G. Armstrong, whom he defeated by nine votes.

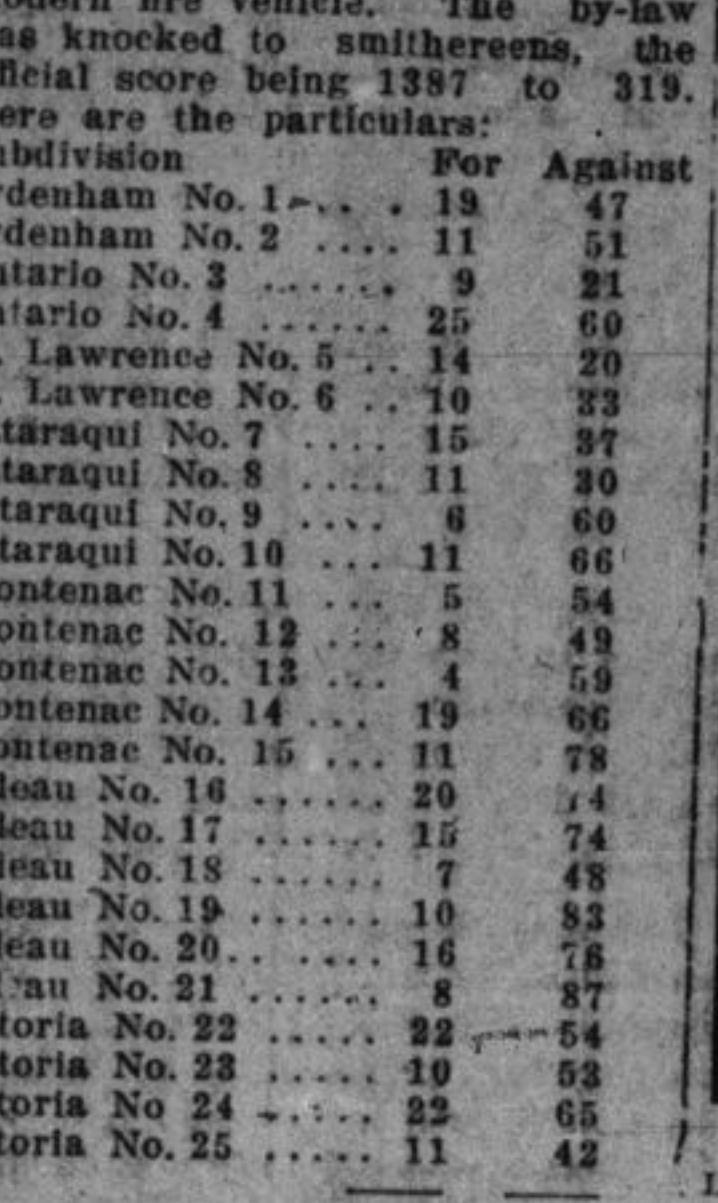

LABOR CIRCLES HAPPY

OVER ELECTION OF JAMES G. BEWS IN RIDEAU WARD. Addresses Were Delivered—The Turkington Affair to be Investigated—Some Warm Things Were Said. There was great rejoicing in labor circles on Monday evening after the election returns were all in, and it was found that James G. Bews, the labor candidate for Rideau ward, had been elected by a majority of nine votes. The labor party had placed three men in the field, namely James G. Bews in Rideau ward and Robert Wright in Cataragui ward for aldermen, and William Godwin for school trustee in the same ward as Mr. Bews. Only one was elected, but nevertheless the party felt delighted over its victory, which was one well deserved, as Mr. Bews is a capable young man and a credit to the labor party.

At the Labor Hall a number of addresses were given. Alderman-elect Bews was called upon to say a few words. He thanked the men for the support they had given him and hoped that he would give them value in return. It was his intention to look after the interests of the labor party, and also give his best to the city at large. He suggested that a labor representative for every ward in the city in the next election, and then there would be fewer acclamations to the council board. William Godwin and Robert J. Wright both expressed their opinion of the election which had just closed. They stated that they had been up against a hard proposition, but were not discouraged with the result. Frederick Curtis, a mason, who had occasion to visit Frontenac ward might say a few words in reference to the Ald. Turkington affair. He stated that some people had called him a "quitter," but such was not the case. When he went to the nomination poll it was with the purpose of nominating Mr. Turkington for alderman for that ward, but he himself was to be nominated for school trustee, but unfortunately, Mr. Turkington had decided in the meantime not to stand for election for some reason unknown to any person as yet.

W. J. Driscoll, who acted as chairman, stated he was going to forget this Frontenac ward affair to the bottom, and that he would go so far as to say that he would not sit on the labor council with Mr. Turkington, who is president of that body.

Deputy Reeve—Joseph P. Hawkey, Glenvale, 294; S. J. Gates, 233. Councilors—A. E. Weller, Kingston Junction, 241; B. Conter, Cataragui, 227; J. Clyde, Cataragui, 225; H. F. Telver, 216; William Reid, 145. Byron Gordon was re-elected Reeve and Joseph P. Hawkey deputy Reeve.

Garden Island. The following is the governing body of Garden Island, which was elected by acclamation: Reeve—Byron Gordon; Councilors—S. D. Calver, J. B. Verrier, B. H. Williams, Joseph Sauve.

Township of Wolfe Island. The Wolfe Island election resulted in a victory for Dr. William Spangis as Reeve, with Daniel McLaren, William Allum, Daniel Taggart and G. Gillespie as councilors. The vote was: For Reeve—Dr. William Spangis, 198; G. Grindley, 88. For Councilors—Daniel McLaren, 197; William Allum, Daniel Taggart, 158; George Gillespie, 141. The defeated candidates were John McGlynn, 140, and William Allinson, 85.
