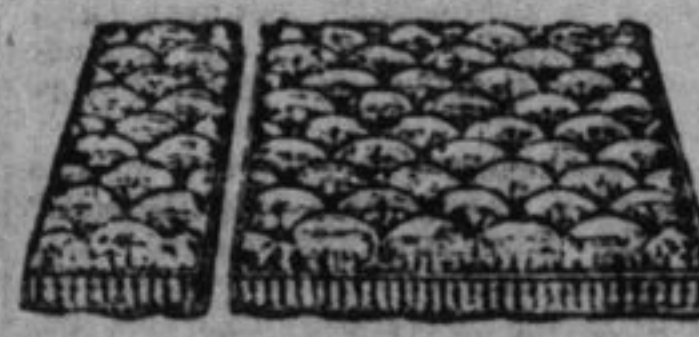
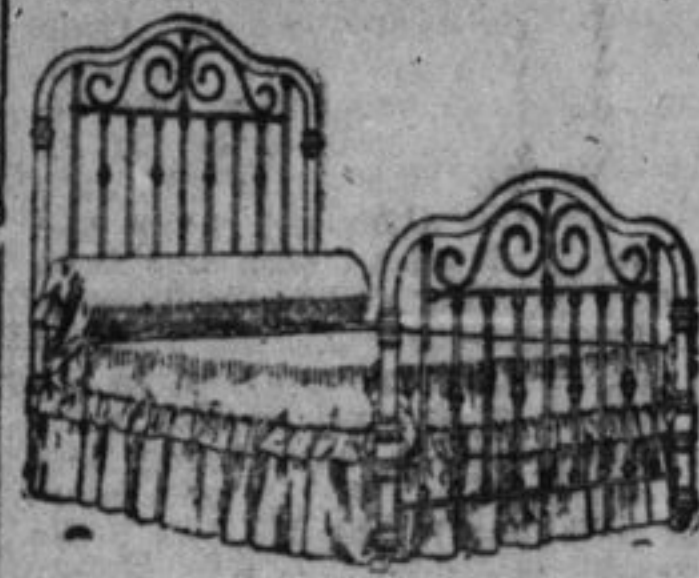

A solemn reception and profession of sisters took place in Our Mother of Sorrows chapel, House of Providence, Tuesday morning, at eight o'clock. The young aspirants, who were clothed in the holy habit, were Miss Helen Curley, Port Huron; Miss Isabel Egan, Westport; Miss Lucy Murphy, Napanee, and Miss Etta O'Rourke, Sault Ste. Marie. Those who made professions of their vows were Sister Mary Gonzaga, formerly Miss M. Bourigan, of Smith's Falls, and Sister M. Victor, formerly Miss Margaret Dunnigan, of Mayo, Quebec.

The ceremony was performed by his grace, Most Reverend M. J. Spratt, D.D., who interrogated the young candidates in the usual form. In the presence of Rev. W. E. Cavanagh, Rev. C. Duffin, Rev. W. E. SHOT WENT INTO FOOT

WHEN RICHARD LAKE FIRED OFF A REVOLVER.

He Was Cleaning Revolver and Accidentally Pulled Trigger—Bullet Was Removed, and Patient Will Recover—Employed as Blacksmith in Construction Camp. While cleaning a revolver, Richard Lake, a Swede, twenty-eight years of age, accidentally shot himself in the left foot, and is now a patient in the general hospital, in this city. Lake was employed as a blacksmith in a construction camp, on the Canadian Pacific railway near Perth, and the mishap occurred in his blacksmith shop, at the camp, Christie Lake. Lake was in the act of cleaning the revolver, and neglected to take the trigger guard off. After cleaning it, he snapped the trigger, with the result that the bullet went into his foot. He was given medical attention, and afterwards removed to the hospital. The bullet was removed on Tuesday. The patient is doing well, and will recover.
