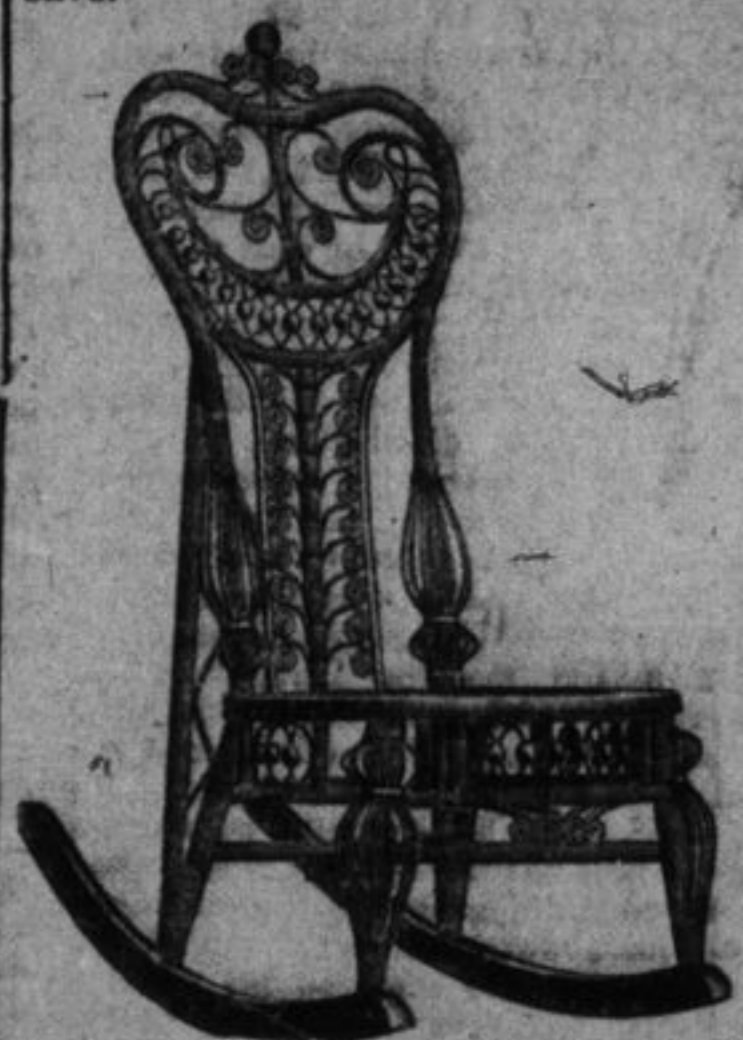

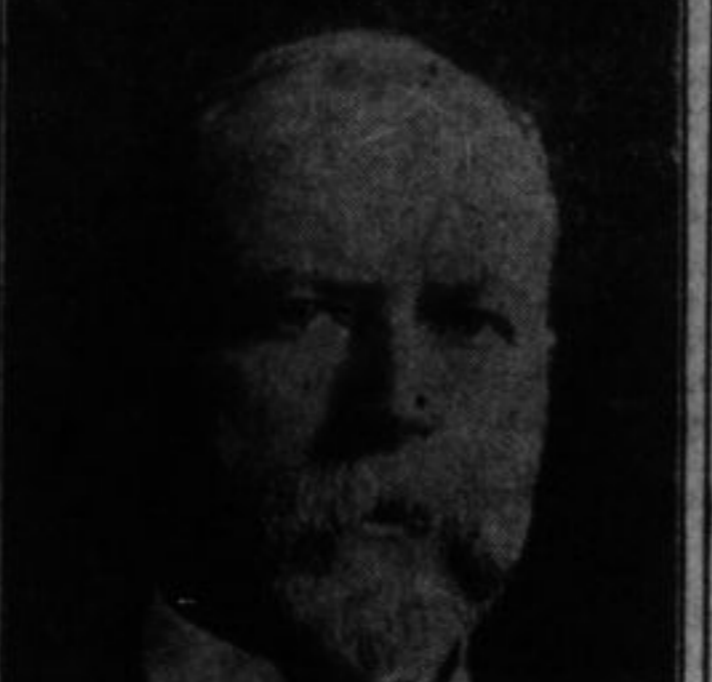

WILLIAM J. TURKINGTON
WAS EXONERATED BY THE LOCAL MASONS' UNION

In Connection With Frontenac Ward Nominations—He Was Not to Blame—Masons Elect Officers and Decide to Hold a Banquet.

He was ill, it was explained and could not look after the matter. Mr. Turkington denied to the Whig any connection or dealing with the conservative party, as had been intimated. He said he had fully expected to run and thought he was nominated until he saw by the Whig, in the account of the nominations, that he had not been.
