Which Fell Over a Year Ago While Under Construction — Sub-Contractor Sues Contractor for Extras

The action brought about by Matthew Revell, of Verona the sub-contractor, who erected the Sydenham high school additions, asking for certain extras from George Larkins, the contractor by whom he was employed, occupied the attention of Judge Price, at the court chambers, on Monday morning and afternoon.

Matthew Revell, who was engaged by George Larkins to do the mason work, was the first witness called. He swore that he had been engaged to do the work for \$2,200, of which \$1,600 had been passed before the wall fell. The contract called that Mr. Larkins should supply the material and Mr. Revell and his men do the work. The wall fell on Dec. 31st, 1911, and he swore he saw the wall bulging during the afternoon.

When further examined he accounted for the fall because of the timber put in the lentils.
