Senior Frontenacs Have Three More Games to Play—Queen's Slogan—Interest in Frontenac-K.C.I. Game.

The Kingston Collegiate Institute team was due to leave on Friday afternoon for Belleville, where it plays that team on its own ice in the evening. The result of this game is looked forward to with great interest. A defeat for the high school boys would mean a bad pull-down in their standing. So far the boys have won all their games, and a win will put them in good standing for the championship of this group. During the season the team has made a most creditable showing.

When it was announced that the team was considering entering the O. H. A., several objections, as to the advisability of it taking the jump, were raised, but the boys have made good.

K. C. I. had a decidedly hard game in Picton last Tuesday evening. They were well treated, though, and all survived the battle. The size and layout of the rink puzzled the locals. During the first period they took their soundings, as it were, and came back in the second half and landed six counters, as compared with the two of the opposing team. Brownfield, who holds down cover point, is laid up with a bad cold, and it is feared on Thursday that he would be forced to stay home. If he is unable to go his position will likely be filled by Singleton, who has been playing spare man all season.

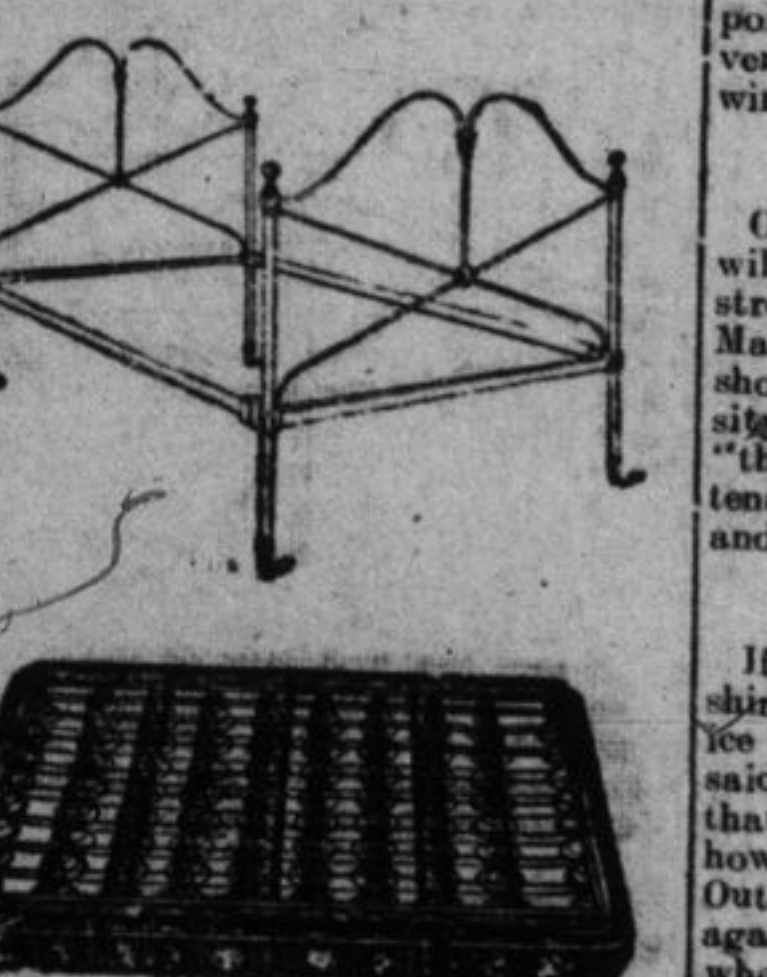

AN ORANGE MEETING
WAS ADDRESSED BY THOMAS DUFF, OF TORONTO.

Who Spoke About Protestant and Romanist Differences—Much to be Learned From the System of the Roman Church.

The Orange Lodges of the city united in an open meeting on Thursday evening in the Orange hall to hear an address of W. Bro. Thomas Duff, of Toronto. Charles G. Clarke, District Master of the order, was in the chair and introduced the speaker.

Mr. Duff explained the object for which the Orange association was formed, and added to it an interesting discussion of the essential differences between the teaching of Romanism and that of Protestantism. The Roman Catholic clergy, he said, and it is to their credit, look after the teaching of their children, so that any Roman Catholic child of seven years can tell the difference between the two religions. The Protestants could profit by this example.

Mr. Duff also dealt with the political side of the order, and urged the members to be neither hide bound grins nor dyed-in-the-wool Tories, but on all questions affecting the welfare of the country, particularly from a Protestant standpoint, to drop party politics and vote for the man or the government, which is prepared to support the principles for which we are instituted.

The speaker also said that the difference between the faith of Protestants and Romanists, lies in the latter's doctrine of transubstantiation, which teaches that the bread and wine at communion is changed into the actual body and blood of Christ, while the Protestants believe that the elements are based in the statement made by our Saviour in his death on the cross.

A vote of thanks was moved by Ald. Edward Bennet and seconded by Joseph H. Donaldson to which the audience, which crowded the hall, gave hearty approval in applause.
