



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MEETING

WAS ADDRESSED BY THOMAS DUFF, OF TORONTO.

Who Spoke About Protestant and Romanist Differences-Much to be Learned From the System of the Roman Church. The Orange Lodges of the city united

in an open meeting on Thursday even-ing in the Orange hall to hear an ad-dress of W. Bro. Thomas Duff, of Toronto. Charles G. Clarke, District Master of the order, was in the chair and introduced the speaker.

Mr. Duli explained the object for which the Orange association was formed, and added to it an interesting dis-

cussion of the essential differences be-tween the teaching of Romanism and that of Protestantism.
