London, Feb. 26.—The reputation of Lieut. Hans Wagner, of the Austro-Hungarian army, as a war correspondent, is to be determined by an Austrian court of justice, according to information received here from the Austrian capital.

MURDER OF MADERO AND SUAREZ.

WHITE SLAVE TRAFFIC.

Supreme Court of U.S. Upholds Validity of Federal Act.

Washington, Feb. 26.—On the theory that traffic in women in interstate commerce may be regulated by legislation as well as the traffic in drugs, foods or cattle, the supreme court of the United States upheld the validity of the federal white slave traffic act of 1910. It had been contended that the question of morality was reserved for action by the states.

A YOUTHFUL DIPLOMAT.

May Represent U.S. at Court of St. James.

Washington, Feb. 26.—Unless the democrats of the senate recede from their present filibuster against the confirmation of all presidential appointments before March 4th, the important negotiations over the free toll feature of the Panama canal act and the six-power loan to China will be in the hands of a youth of twenty-four years after that date.

Hallett Johnson, barely twenty-four years old, and with only six months' experience in the diplomatic service, will be the chief representative of the United States at the court of St. James after March 4th, and will be obliged to take up the complicated problems connected with the Panama canal dispute and the six-power loan, dealing with such men as Sir Edward Grey and Lloyd-George, unless the senate agrees before next Monday to confirm the nomination of Irwin B. Laughlin, whom President Taft has nominated as secretary of the em-

bassy to Great Britain.

Ambassador Reid's death left a vacancy which has not been filled. In the ordinary course of events Mr. Laughlin, the secretary, would be in charge. Mr. Laughlin has been nominated for the position of secretary, but the senate, grouping all the diplomatic appointments together, refuses to confirm any of them.

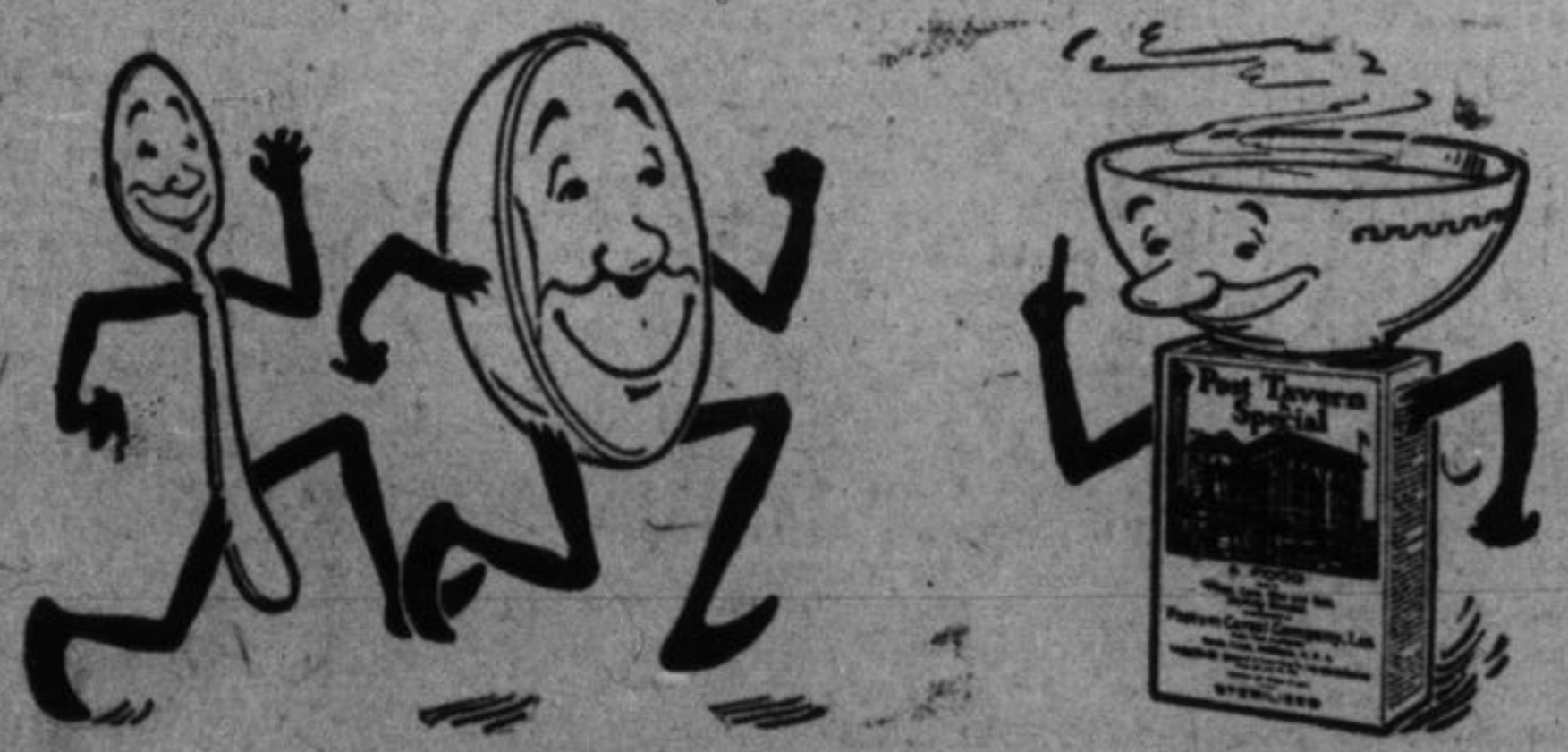
William P. Cresson, the second secretary, is absent on leave, and if the senate fails to confirm Laughlin, the duties of the embassy will fall upon young Johnson, recently out of college.

MANY INDEPENDENT FACTORIES ARE STARTING UP.

Dominion Canners is now Making Contracts for the Coming Season.—Prices will be Much the Same as in 1912.

Toronto, Feb. 25.—The Dominion Canners, Limited, is likely to have more competition the coming season than in any previous year, but that fact is not disturbing the management to any extent.

While a great many independent factories are starting up, the concern in question is only building three to replace those that were found to be in poor condition. No added district will be invaded.

Dominion Canners is now engaged in making contracts for the coming season; R. Innis, the secretary, says that prices will remain practically the same as the were last year.

Mr. Innis adds that the canning industry is at present in good condition, but he fears that its very prosperity may lead to its being overdone.

Pressed Steel Car Report.

The annual report of the Pressed Steel Car Company has been received. It showed \$19,019,000 gross earnings, compared with \$11,331,000 for the twelve months ended December 31, 1911. The surplus after the payment of the preferred dividend amounted to \$3,500,000, compared with \$17,835 for the previous year.

On Paying Basis.

Toronto, Feb. 25.—P. Kirkgaard, Managing Director of the Cordova mine in Hastings county, estimates that the output of the Cordova mine this year will be \$125,000. Already more than \$300,000 worth of gold has been taken out of the mine, which is now on a paying basis. The thirty-stamp mill, with cyanide process, has a daily capacity of about one hundred tons.

Worse Than a Year Ago.

Toronto, Feb. 25.—The record of commercial mortality in the Dominion and across the border last week did not show up as favorably as during the similar period last year. In Canada there were 27 failures as against 23 in the previous week. 34 the week before that, and 26 in the same week of last year. In the United States the insolencies numbered 334, which compared with 319 the previous week, 309 the week before that, and 299 in the same week of 1912. Liabilities of failures thus far reported for February are considerably greater than those for the same period last year.

C. P. R.'s New Issue.

Ottawa, Feb. 25.—The Canadian Pacific Railway has published a formal call upon shareholders in connection with the new stock issue. In addition to the 20 per cent. deposit at time of the subscription \$35 per share is payable on April 14, \$35 on Oct. 16, \$35 on Aug. 18, and \$35 on Oct. 20, 1913.

Financial Notes.

Toronto men are said to have bought Silver Cliff mine for \$150,000.

A million dollar fruit industry is to be established at Winona, Ontario. The Ontario Fruit Growers' Association has given notice of the incorporation of the E. D. Smith & Son Limited, which has an authorized capital of \$1,000,000.

Despite reports of possibly diminished trade activity in Europe, the increase of \$21,300,000 in Great Britain's January imports of merchandise was wholly due to increased receipts of raw materials of manufacture. Such importations ran \$24,000,000 beyond January, 1912.

The Brazilian Traction company listed \$15,000,000 of bonds on the Toronto Stock Exchange.

Dominion Steel Corporation's rail business this year is the largest on record and heavy shipments continue to be reported from the Sydney plant.

Dividends on the \$100,000,000 common stock of the Illinois Traction Company are expected to begin on May 15th, with the initial rate of 3 per cent.

Application has been made to the management of the Montreal Stock Exchange to list the issues of the Macdonald Company, Winnipeg, the common stock of which has been a feature of the trading in the unlisted section for some time past.

No Flowers at Funerals.

Cincinnati, Ohio, Feb. 26.—A novel way to decrease the high cost of doing business was devised here by the board of managers of St. Avies church, one of the largest Catholic parishes in Southern Ohio, when an announcement was made that in the future no funerals to which flowers are permitted to be sent will be allowed held in the church.

Denounced Government.

Toronto, Feb. 26.—In a short address at the third annual meeting of the Toronto Chinese Christian Association, held in Knox church, Rev. A. B. Winchester bitterly denounced the attitude of the provincial government in granting charters to many institutions which permitted gambling and other forms of vice to go on unrestrained.

Plen For Education to Jake World Ambidexterous.

Chicago, Feb. 25.—Left-handed persons formed the congregation of a south-side Methodist Episcopal church last night. They had been called together to hear a plea for school instruction intended to make the world ambidexterous.

Ushers used the left hand in greeting and attending the service, and the pastor, Rev. William Albert Fry, took advantage of the occasion to criticize those who held that right-handed persons are in any way superior to those who just as naturally use the left hand. He found fault with the dictionary which says that the word implies uselessness and lack of skill. He mentioned Babe Marquard and Tyros Cobb as being left-handed persons superior in the occupation of baseball playing.

He said that the crown prince of Germany and most of the crowned heads of Europe were either left-handed or ambidexterous.

Incensed at Statements of Governor—Deputation Sails for England.

London, Feb. 26.—Colonial Secretary Harcourt has been informed that a deputation of the leading merchants of Gibraltar will sail for England immediately in order to acquaint him of the feeling of anxiety that prevails there over the statements of the governor, Sir Archibald Hunter. Memorials have also been signed by Gibraltar jurors, Chambers of Commerce, and the Stock Exchange.

The committee, among other things, says the governor claimed in a recent speech that he knew Gibraltar far better than anyone else; that the Chambers of Commerce thought of nobody but themselves; that Gibraltar jurors were not serious and unjust; that he might soon have to establish a press censorship; that Gibraltarians speak English worse than Egyptian donkey boys; and that the town is like the Argentinian stables. Adding: "I am determined to enact order and decency here from everybody who comes into the fortress. I command Gibraltar."

Colonial Secretary Sir Frederick Evans left unexpectedly yesterday for England. He is believed to have been summoned to the colonial office in London.
