A LOCOMOTIVE ROLLED

DOWN AN EMBANKMENT KILLING TWO MEN.

The Engineer Escaped Miraculously—Locomotive Slipped Off Ice Rails at the Sea, Toronto.

Toronto, March 3.—Fireman George Toms, of Havelock, and Brakeman J. Smart, of Parry Sound, were killed instantly when the engine of which they were in charge slid off the track, shot forward and rolled down the bank at east Don early this morning, on the C.N.R.

About five miles north of Rosedale station the engine, which was going about twenty miles an hour, suddenly slipped on the icy rails, and breaking loose from the rest of the train went off the rails, tottered a moment, then turned over on its side and slid down the embankment.

Brakeman John Smart, of Mount Alberts, taking what he thought was his only chance of escape, jumped and was caught by the following tender, and run over by the rest of the train.

Toms, who was crushed under the engine before he had an opportunity to jump, was mangled almost beyond recognition. Engineer Scott stayed with the engine. His escape was miraculous. He was thrown through the doorway and landed downhill unharmed.

A Wreck At Cayuga.

Hamilton, March 3.—The fast Wash Detroit-Buffalo flyer, No. 6, went into the switch at Cayuga at 7:15 o'clock this morning. Three sleepers and two chair cars rolled down the steep embankment. The cause of the wreck is as yet unknown, though it is thought to be due to spreading rails and storm conditions. The list of injured include Mel Shepherd, the well-known runner and Olympic competitor, who has frequently been seen at Canadian track meets. Thirteen others were also hurt, all United States.

Shepherd was returning from a western track meet with the silver cups he had won, stowed away in his pocket. Three doctors and three nurses were rushed to the scene and dressed the wounds of the injured, who were taken to a local hotel.

Conductor Killed at Belleville.

Belleville, March 3.—Robert A. Doyle, of Toronto, conductor on an eastbound G.T.R. freight train, was instantly killed at an early hour as a result of a rear-end collision between two freight trains in a snow storm. Both trains were eastern bound, and the forward train was standing still when the engine of the second train ploughed its way through to the van, where Doyle was seated. The victim's neck was broken and he was otherwise terribly injured. James Murray, brakeman, of Toronto, was slightly injured. Doyle was a married man.

A Wreck Near Hanover.

Stratford, March 3.—An official statement of the G.T.R. wreck north of Hanover, this morning, says that the derailment was caused by a piece of iron, apparently part of a flange, on the track at the crossing. The speed was thirty miles an hour. Conductor T. Hill was in charge. Seven persons were injured, five being trainmen and two passengers. The latter were only slightly bruised. The news agent had his elbow dislocated, the baggage man had his left arm broken; Engineer Irwin and both firemen of the double-header were bruised. Both engines were badly crippled.

Wreck Near New York.

New York, March 3.—Traffic on the Pennsylvania railroad north and south was practically demoralized today as the result of the blowing up of the engine drawing United States troops to the inauguration ceremonies. The engineer and the firemen were badly scalded and the locomotive was wrecked. Wires in the vicinity are all down as the result of flying pieces of engine.

LEUT.-COL. IRVING IS TO BE WARDEN OF PENITENTIARY

While the appointments have not yet been gazetted it is understood that the new warden of the provincial penitentiary at Portsmouth will be Lieut.-Col. A. G. Irving, I.S.O., of Stony Mountain penitentiary, Manitoba, who has been in the service a good many years. Col. Irving served in the Canadian militia during the Fenian raid of 1866, the Red River rebellion and the North-West rebellion of 1885. It is expected that the appointment will be made this week, as information comes from Ottawa that it is on the slate.

Major W. S. Hughes, who it was thought would be Dr. Platt's successor, is to be appointed a penitentiary inspector, for which position he is splendidly qualified.

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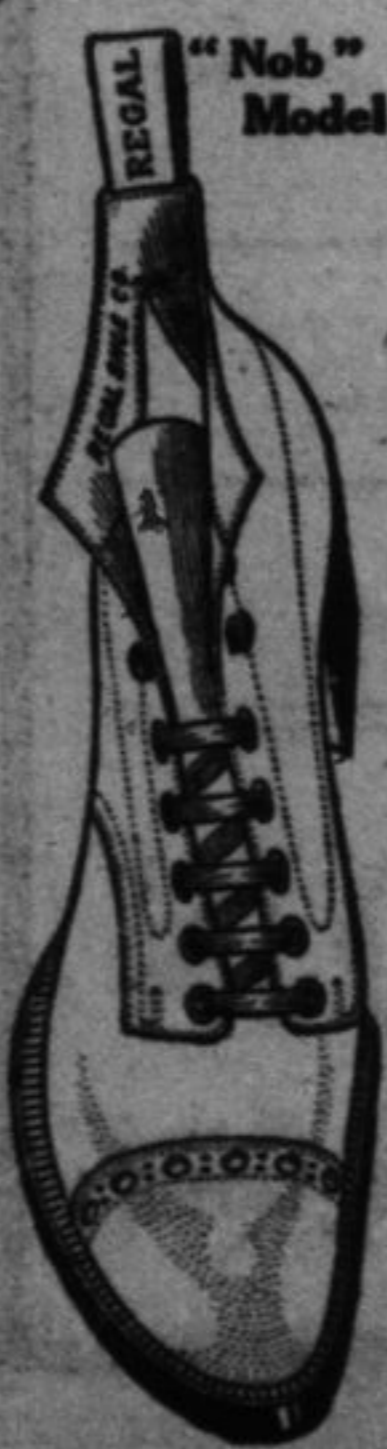
