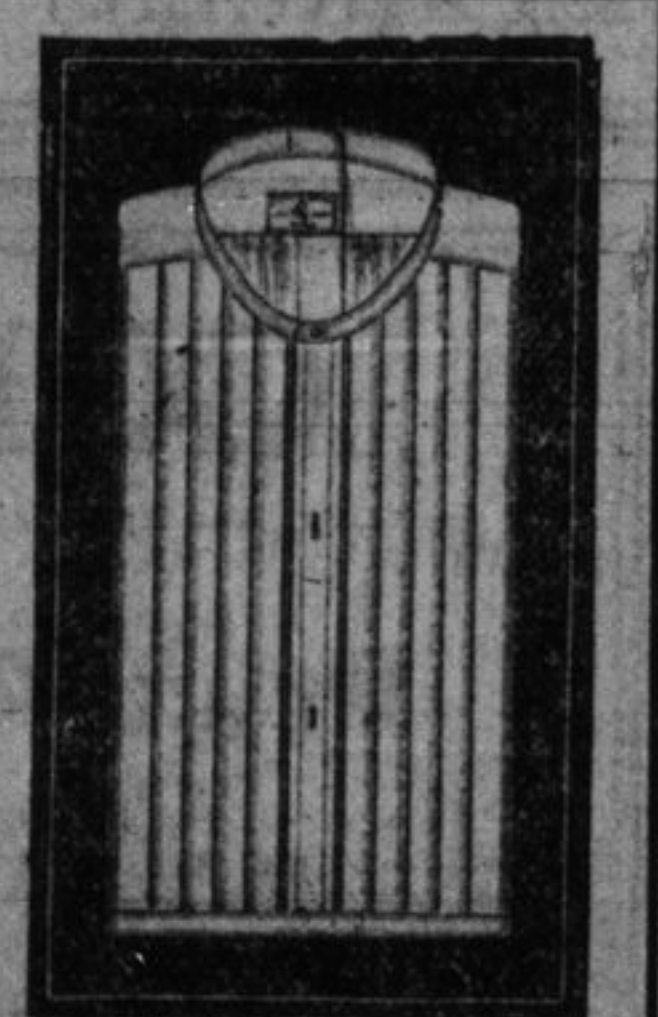

HERE IS THE REASON OF LIBERAL PARTY ASKING VOTE OF PEOPLE.

On the Navy Question—If All Voted According to Their Pledges the Borden Government Would Have Only Five Majority.

The question is being asked why has the opposition the right to demand an appeal to the people on this question of a permanent policy of naval tribute as presented by Premier Borden. It is because the government, if its supporters had voted according to their pledges to their constituents before the election of 1911, would have had a majority of but 6, instead of 30, while had Hon. Mr. Monk been in the house their majority would have been only 5. That is, while they have a house majority, they have not a popular majority. This also in a parliament which is 13 members short of the constitutional requirements according to last census. It is therefore evident that the government has not a popular majority behind it on this question.

On February 27th, when the second reading of the naval bill was carried the government had a majority of 30—114 to 84.

In parliament there are twenty nationalists—that is, members who were elected to parliament pledged to their constituents to oppose any kind of taxation for a navy. These twenty nationalists are Messrs. Archib. Barrette, Bellemare, Bousquet, Blondin, Coderre, Forget, Gauthier (Gaspé), Girard (who ran as a supporter of the Canadian navy, and suddenly at the end of the election turned against it), Guilbault, Lavallee, Lesperance, Lamarche, Mondou, Monk, Sevigny, Nantel, Paquet, Pelletier and Rainville.

Twelve of these nationalists formed part of the government's majority for the navy bill—Messrs. Blondin, Nantel, Paquet, Pelletier, Rainville, Coderre, Forget, Gauthier, Girard, Lavallee, Lesperance, Sevigny—voting directly contrary to the pledges under which they were elected.

Had they been true to their pledges and really represented their constituents, they would have opposed the naval bill, and reduced the government majority to six. Had Mr. Monk been in the house, he has since stated he would also have opposed the bill, which would have reduced the majority to five.

Therefore, had the members of parliament all been present and voted according to the dictates of their constituents the government's majority would have been but five—and the opposition would have represented a large majority of the popular vote. And this in a house 13 members short of what the constitution calls for according to the last census.

The opposition position is that a government so situated has no right to attempt to force through parliament a measure making so great a change in the constitutional procedure of the country without appealing to the people. Therefore in the interests of the people, a majority of whom they really represent on this question, they are in duty bound to use every means in their power to see that the voice of the people is heard. It is because of the very force of these arguments that the government is so determined to force this measure through, and even to invoke the closure to shut off the voice of the people.
