THE NEW KING SOBBED HENRY P. SMITH DEAD

AS HE EMBRACED HIS YOUNGER BROTHER, NICHOLAS.

Greek Cabinet Proclaims Allegiance—Queen Alexandra At First Would Not Believe That Her Royal Brother Had Been Killed.

Saloniki, Turkey, March 19.—King Constantine, of Greece, first son of King George, assassinated yesterday, and general of his late father's army in several glorious victories in the present war with the Turks, was received here, this afternoon, with all possible enthusiasm and homage when he arrived from the firing line at Janina to direct the removal of the body of the late king, who fell yesterday at the hands of Alope Schinas. The king of one day sobbed audibly as he embraced his younger brother, Prince Nicholas. Although he was not yet proclaimed king, he was addressed as "your majesty" by his relatives and officers of the troops. With his brother he made preparations for receiving his widowed mother on her way here from Athens, on a Russian war-ship.

The new king assumed command of the entire Greek troops in Turkey immediately, and made preparations for an immediate advance all along the line against the Turks, with a view to more speedily securing the conclusion of the war.

Queen Alexandra Receives News.

London, March 19.—Queen Mother Alexandra, sister of the assassinated King George of Greece, was completely prostrated this morning on receiving undeniable confirmation of the news from Saloniki. For a long time her majesty refused to believe it. It is understood she will try to go to Athens for the funeral. Prince Arthur of Connaught, son of the Canadian governor general, will represent King George.

Proclaimed Allegiance.

Athens, March 19.—The prime minister and cabinet, to-day, proclaimed their allegiance to King Constantine. This removes all doubts as to the acceptability of the new king to the majority of the Greeks, although some socialist newspapers suggests now is the time to make Greece a republic.

Stocks Not Affected.

London, March 19.—The stock markets of Europe were not affected by the assassination of King George of Greece, but the resignation of Premier Briand, of France, caused a noticeable weakness in the securities in anyway related to France, especially French government bonds. Grecian government consols and bonds remained firm.

MUST HAVE A SCHOOL

ITALIANS ARE NOT SATISFIED WITH THE CATECHISM.

300 Families Are Interested—Threaten to Move Unless Council Agrees to Have a New School Erected for Them.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., March 19.—Declaring that they did not want to bring up a generation of pick and shovel men, a large deputation of Italians waited on the city council last night, asking that a public school be erected in ward 9. They positively refused to send their children to separate schools, on the ground that too much time was spent in religion, and they did not want their children to have any religious education at school, but at church. "When our children grow up," said the spokesman, "we want them to be able to take positions in banks and commercial houses, and this can never be done when they are taught the catechism more than English and arithmetic.

"We want to be Canadians and worthy members of the empire, and to do this our children must have the education set down by the public schools.

"You may think we exaggerate, but I can say that if our children are denied the education they need here there are 300 Italian families who will move to a place where they can get it."

Several of the delegation were well-to-do tradesmen, and offered to assist by giving of substantial sums, while all assured the council that taxes would be paid to the public school, whatever other influences were exerted to order them otherwise.

THE THRILLING ESCAPE

PASSED AWAY WEDNESDAY, AFTER TWO WEEKS' ILLNESS.

Well-Known Architect Succumbed to Pneumonia—Prepared Plans For Many of Kingston's Prominent Buildings—Active Member of Yacht Club.

Death, on Wednesday morning, removed one of Kingston's best-known citizens, in the person of Henry P. Smith, architect. Mr. Smith passed away, in the Hotel Dieu, at ten o'clock, after an illness extending over two weeks. A week ago, he was taken ill, with pneumonia, and complications set in. Deceased had a wide circle of friends, and the announcement of his death was received with sincere regret.

The late Mr. Smith was one of the city's best architects and many of the prominent buildings in the city stand as a monument to his work. A coincidence in connection with his work was that the first task he undertook after entering into business himself was that of getting out the plans for work at Notre Dame convent, and his last piece of work, that of preparing plans for the addition to the convent, work upon which is nearing completion. Mr. Smith had many important works on hand and it can be fully said that he passed away in the midst of his work, for he was busily engaged up till the time that illness overtook him, and he had to give up. Through it all, however, he bore up bravely.

Deceased was a son of the late Patrick Smith, a prominent merchant in Kingston years ago, and was born here. He studied architecture with William Newlands, in this city, and also took a course at the Art Institute, New York. He had been in business for himself here for fourteen years.

Mr. Smith was prominent in Roman Catholic societies, being a member of the C.M.B.A., the Knights of Columbus, and the Catholic Order of Foresters. For years he was a prominent member of the Kingston Yacht Club, and was regarded as one of the very best yachtsmen in the city. He was secretary-treasurer of the regatta committee, and took an active part in all the work of the club.

He is survived by his wife, one son, about six years of age, one sister, Mrs. Joseph Quinn, of Jackson, Mich., and two brothers, John, of Ottawa, and Frederick, of St. Louis.

The funeral will take place, on Friday afternoon, at 1:30 o'clock, from his late residence, 260 King street, to St. Mary's cathedral, where a solemn libera will be sung at two o'clock. The remains will be interred in St. Mary's cemetery.
