WHY EXEMPT IRON MINES.

Cohalt Board of Trade Will Ask Hon. Mr. Hearst.

Cohalt, April 2.—To interview the government on the eight-hour bill for underground miners eight members of the Cohalt Board of Trade are in Toronto. They desire that the bill shall be made more explicit on several points as now both mine owners and men do not know exactly what it means. They want to know whether eight hours means from the surface to the surface, or from the place where they are working underground back to the same place. They also ask that the clause fixing the noon meal at half an hour be eliminated, since it will compel the men to eat underground. And they are curious to ask the Hon. Mr. Hearst why iron mines are exempt from the amendment to the act when silver mines are not.

GIVES UP OFFICE.

Resignation as Provisional President of Dominican Republic.

San Domingo, Dominican Republic, April 2.—Archbishop Noel, at the session of the national congress, tendered his resignation as provisional president of the Dominican Republic. The resignation was accepted and congress will appoint his successor. Ill-health was given as the reason for Archbishop Noel's action. It being announced that he was obliged to go to Europe to take the cure Gen. Horacio Vasquez, Gen. Juan Jimenez and Frederico Velasquez H. are candidates for the presidency.
