**IN MARINE CIRCLES**

**SCHOONER CALKINS IN PORT WITH CARGO OF COAL.**

Keystone Company Looking For Place For Vessels To Be Laid Up Next Winter—Movements of Vessels Reported Along Water Front.

The schooner Bertie Calkins, arrived at the Grove Inn on Saturday morning at eight o'clock, with a cargo of coal from Oswego. The coal is for the Frontenac Coal and Lumber company. Capt. "Archie" Oliver is in command of the Calkins.

The steamer John Crerar made preparations on Saturday to clear for Oswego to load coal for Chicago. The steamer Sowards cleared on Saturday for Oswego to load her second cargo of coal for Kingston.

John Walker, marine superintendent of the Keystone Transportation company, has been spending a few days in the city, making arrangements to have some of the vessels of his company laid up at this port next winter.

The steamer Alexandria will be on her regular route in a few weeks' time. The vessel is being put in readiness for the season's work at Pictou.

It is expected that the steamer Toller will be floated from the dock of the Kingston Shipbuilding company the middle of next week. The steam is being installed to replace the gas burning engine. The boiler of the Toller has been lowered into the aft hold, and the other one is following. The engine will be placed when the freighter is floated.

The steamer Pierpont, which ran the Wolfe Island ferry route on Thursday and Friday, had to land at Crawford's wharf on Friday afternoon on account of the storm. She had been making landings at Swift's.

The steamer Rideau King will commence the Ottawa-Kingston Rideau river trips on the first of May.

The steamer Pierpont went to Amherst Island and Bath on Saturday and brought down a large number of passengers. She returned in the afternoon.

The steamer Wolfe Islander left the dock on Friday afternoon after undergoing repairs to her wheel. During the time she has been laid up, the steamer Pierpont replaced her on the island route. The Islander made her trip to the city on Saturday morning carrying one of the largest crowds of the season.

The steamer Pierpont made a trip to Amherst Island on Saturday morning and carried a large number of the islanders to the city. There seems to be no reason why the residents of Amherst Island should remain on the island for weeks at a time without being able to reach the city. It is stated by the steamer boat men that a boat makes good money on her trip to the island, and for that reason should make the trip oftener. It has been suggested that the steamer Wolfe Islander make the trip once a week so as to allow the islanders to attend the market.

**Bishop Fallon's Campaign.**

London, Ont., April 12.—The results of further activity by Bishop Fallon in his campaign to make London one of the foremost Catholic centres in Canada became known in an official statement from the establishment in this city of a convention of the Sisters of the Precious Blood. For some days His Lordship has been negotiating for the purchase of the residence of the late Dr. Anderson on Ridout street for the purpose of the new order here, and it is expected that the deal will be closed. The Sisters of the Precious Blood will make vestments and garments for members of all religious orders in this city and district, including the seminarians from the institution established by His Lordship here.

**Losses Jewels Worth \$50,000.**

New York, April 12.—A London special cable despatch says: "The Hon. Mrs. Charles Craven, widow of the Hon. Charles Eric Craven, a brother of the Earl of Craven, married Cornelia Martin, of New York, lost, or has been robbed of, jewels valued at \$50,000, as well as \$1,500 in gold and notes. The jewels include a Russian tiara set with diamonds, a ruby and diamond necklace, a neck chain set with diamonds and pearls, a two platinum and gold watches, a dog collar set with diamonds, and two bows set with diamonds. She offers a reward of \$2,500 to the taxi driver if by any chance she left the jewels in the cab."

**May Build Concrete Walk.**

Cape Vincent, N.Y., April 12.—Some years ago the idea of a walk to the Riverside cemetery was originated and a fund for that purpose raised in various ways by citizens, and is now in the Cape Vincent bank, but owing to complicated circumstances the project has never been perfected and at present it has been practically given up. The reason given is the probability of a state road being built within two years, which, when completed, of course, the walk will not be needed. One of the proposals to use this fund now, is to build a wide cement walk from the road to the vault entrance.

**Thirty Lashes For Desperadoes.**

Calgary, April 12.—One year in jail with thirty lashes each was the punishment inflicted by Magistrate Sanders on Alexander Robson and Peter Kelly, who were convicted of assaulting and robbing Mike Keating, a lumber jack. The assault and robbery took place in a lane adjoining one of the busiest thoroughfares of the city. Keating was under the influence of liquor when he was attacked.

**White Slave Traffic at Welland.**

Welland, Ont., April 12.—Mrs. Mildred Kahn is in jail here, charged with being implicated in the white slave traffic. Officials claim they have a clear case against her, as she was arranging to leave town with a young girl, having the girl's clothes in her grip, and had endeavored to induce others to go. She had a hearing in court behind closed doors, and was remanded until to-day.

**Use Mail Boxes As Targets.**

Galt, April 12.—Vandals have been making a target for rifle and shotguns of rural mail delivery boxes on routes adjacent to Galt. The matter was reported to the police, and a watch will be kept on suspected parties. The statute provides a penalty of five years' imprisonment for this offense.

**NO LOCAL OPTION ACTION TAKEN IN GANANOQUE.**

**A Mission Circle Concert—Death in St. Catharines of Frederick Emery Formerly of Gananoque.**

Gananoque, April 12.—The efforts of the young ladies of the Winona mission Circle of Grace church were crowned with success last evening at "Ye olde folks' concert" given under their auspices in the lecture room. The attendance was a fairly good one. The young ladies, in habiliments, stylish in the time of their grandmothers' girlhood days, did the honors of the occasion to perfection. The programme all consisted of vocal selections and recitations well known fifty years ago, and made a decided hit. After the programme refreshments were dispensed by the young ladies. The membership of the circle is less than fifty, but this year it has been raised, for missionary purposes, upwards of \$100. The sum of \$85 will be expended in furnishing a room, to be known as the Winona Mission Circle room of Gananoque, in the new Rutherfordian Girls' Home, in Edmondston, Alta. Harmony lodge, No. 15, Daughters of Rebekah, were hostesses at a fine "At Home" in Turner's assembly hall, on Thursday evening. The place was packed to the doors, a large number of out-of-town guests being at the Rees' orchestra furnished an excellent programme.

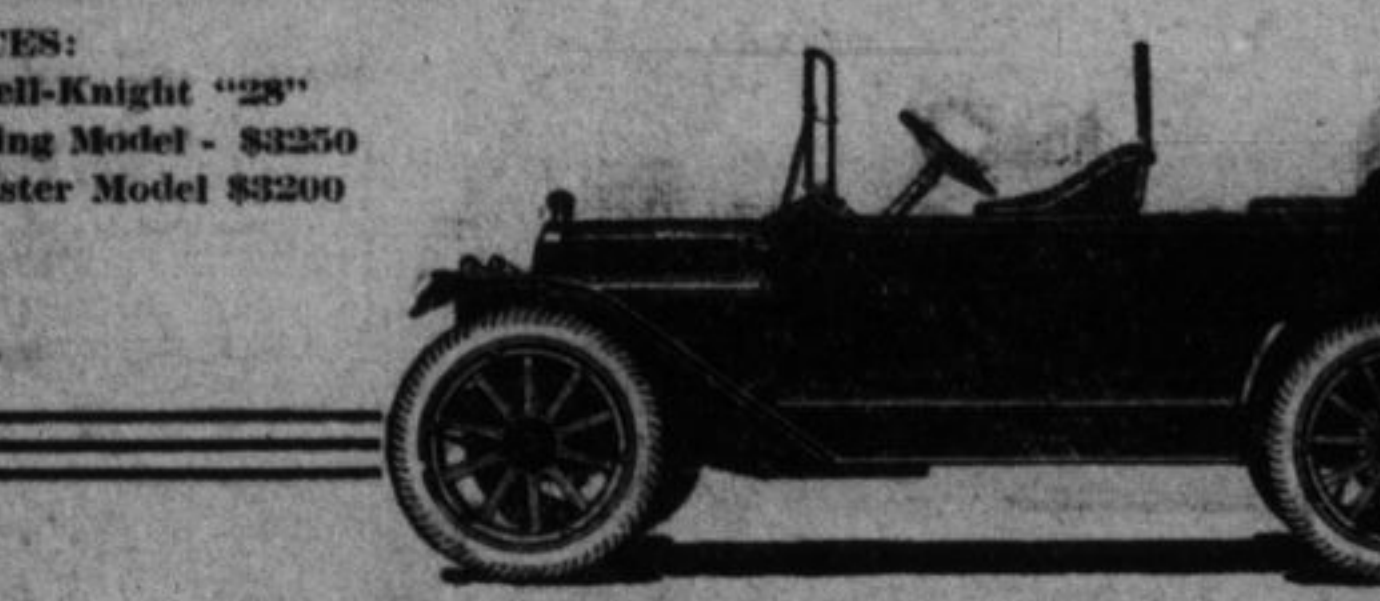
