### COL. W. G. GWATKIN "ROUND ROBIN" USED

TO BE TEMPORARY COMMANDANT OF THE R.M.C.

It is Denied That Col. Crowe Refused An Extension of Time Owing To Friction With the Minister of Militia.

According to a report from Ottawa on Wednesday morning, Col. W. G. Gwatkin (imperial army), C.M., general staff officer for mobilization at militia headquarters, Ottawa, has been appointed temporary commandant of the Royal Military College, in succession to Col. J. H. V. Crowe, whose term expires this fall.

Another report from the capital said that the fact that Col. Crowe refused an extension of his term as head of the military school, was due to friction between the minister of militia and himself. Major-General Mackenzie, chief of the general staff, resigning and Col. Crowe retiring at the same time gave rise to comment of this nature. The two British officers were close friends. Col. Crowe is now in Ottawa.

But this rumor is denied here. Col. Crowe is desirous of returning to the imperial service, and has received his appointment at Simla, India. Nevertheless, he enjoyed his four years in Canada, and has proved a most efficient head of the college at Point Frederick.

### ANDREW W. GRAY APPOINTED To Make Good Roads For the Federal Parks



Andrew W. Gray. An Ottawa despatch says: The government has appointed Andrew W. Gray, Kingston's new assistant highways commissioner for Ontario, to be highways commissioner for the parks branch of the interior department. The post is a new one, the intention of the government being to establish good roads for horse and automobile traffic through the national parks. Mr. Gray is an experienced engineer and an expert on road construction. He leaves for the west at once, and will likely make his headquarters in Edmonton.

IN AN ATTEMPT TO START THE WORK OF PAVING.

Some of the Aldermen Opposed to Having the Matter Dealt With This Way and Refused To Sign—What Will Be Action of Council Monday Night?

What will be the decision of the City Council when it meets on Monday evening, to vote the necessary money for the work on the six blocks of permanent pavement?

This is the question which is causing a great deal of talk among citizens. Seventeen out of the twenty-one votes are needed to pass the by-law, and for that reason the interest is keen. When the contract was awarded to the Ontario Asphalt Block company, it was put through on a vote of 16 to 4, which goes to show that one more alderman must be present at the meeting on Monday evening, who will vote in favor of the by-law, if the scheme is to go through.

J. F. Reid, general manager of the company, who is superintending the work on Bisset street, is very anxious that his firm should get the work, and for that reason waited upon the aldermen Wednesday, and asked them to sign a "round robin" to allow the company to commence work at once.

Some of the aldermen do not believe in such a system, and for that reason refused to sign, although they stated that they would vote in favor of the by-law.

It has been intimated that one or two of the aldermen who voted against the first by-law, will vote in favor of the money by-law.

Mayor Higney will not be in the city for Monday's meeting, and Ald. F. J. Hoag will occupy the chair.

### KENNEBEC LADY DEAD.

Her Husband Is Confined to Bed Through Illness.

After an illness extending over a period of six months the death call came to Mrs. Lillie May Veley, wife of John Veley, Kennebec township, in the Kingston general hospital, on Wednesday morning, at an early hour. The deceased lady had been ailing with tuberculosis. She was twenty-seven years of age. At the present time her husband is confined to his home with an attack of pneumonia.

### An Increase in Exports.

With the completion of the proposed Trent canal, it is estimated that there will be a considerable increase in the exports to the United States from this consulate. Much lumber and fish is exported from the Georgian Bay district. At the present time this is taken around the lakes, and much of it enters the states at Buffalo, N. Y. When these and other exports are brought down the Trent canal, a much shorter route, Trenton, which is in this consulate, will be the point of export.

The board is still awaiting information from the Hydro-Electric Commission concerning power for the city.
