### PREPARES TO FINANCE

#### THE OTTAWA-KINGSTON GAS-ELECTRIC LINE.

N. M. Clougher, of London, England, is in the City—Tells of the Plans for the New Railway.

On Tuesday morning the Whig had an interview with N. M. Clougher, of Ottawa, president of the proposed Gas Electric railway which goes under the name of the Ottawa, Rideau Lakes and Kingston Railway company. This company was incorporated by special act of the Legislature of Ontario, March 8th, 1911, and amended March 19th, 1912.

The line which will be about 125 miles in length, after leaving Ottawa, will pass through or near to the towns of Manotick, Azara, Bridlewood, and Kilmarnock, to Smith's Falls. Between Smith's Falls and Kingston the railway is located close to Lombardy, Portland, Elgin, Morton, Seely's Bay, Brewer's Mills, Washburn, Joyceville and Cushehall and from there into the city of Kingston. On the Lanark branch, it is proposed to serve Rideau Ferry, Perth, Balderston, and Lanark.

Mr. Clougher motored here from Ottawa with Engineer H. F. Cook. His object is to look after the freight estimations and make final arrangements before leaving for Europe on the 13th of this month to complete the financial arrangements previous to the undertaking of the construction. The recent developments have tended to the improving of minor details along the route for which the survey is completed. Slight operations in the way of improvements are being made as the grade is being kept down to a low figure of 7-10 per cent. This allows for the rapid and cheap handling of the freight traffic that is so plentiful along the route and for which the line is located, will be able to deal.

Some improvements are being made for the entrance into Ottawa, for although the exact location was not divulged, it was known that a wonderful improvement was made in connection with the entrance to the city and the detail will be known shortly. Some alterations are also to be taken in the route between Perth and Lanark, as a new line has been investigated which will allow for a practical level run between these important towns.

#### Lawn Social At Wolfe Island.

The first lawn social of the season was held Monday evening at McLaren's, Wolfe Island, and despite the cool weather, the steamer Wolfe Islander carried over a hundred young people on her trip over at eight o'clock. Dancing commenced on the arrival of the steamer at the island and was continued to 12.30 a.m. Crosby and O'Connor's orchestra rendered a choice programme of dance music, which was thoroughly enjoyed. The steamer arrived back in the city at 1 a.m.

#### DID NOT ACT IRREGULARLY.

City Auditor Says There Is a Misunderstanding.

City Auditor Muir draws attention to a statement in a Whig editorial note in last Saturday's issue which says:

"The auditor is careful and conscientious. He may have been acting in good faith, in certain cases, and irregularly, and may be criticized therefore. Mr. Muir points out that a member of the Board of Works raised the point as to whether he should have passed the payment of money to the Windsor Asphalt Paving company last fall, when the debenture by-law was not passed. He explains that he did nothing irregularly in passing these accounts. The payments were quite regular as the contract between the city and the company had been duly signed and that was all required by law. It was immaterial whether or not the debenture by-law had been passed."

#### THE LATE JAMES MOORE.

Who Met Death At Donnacona, Que., On Saturday.

The remains of the late James Moore, who met death by falling off a building at Donnacona, Quebec, on Saturday, arrived in the city on Tuesday morning. The remains were taken to the home of deceased's brother-in-law, William Bruce, 126 Nelson street, from where the funeral took place on Tuesday afternoon to Catarqui cemetery.

#### Late Mrs. W. D. Baker.

The Ottawa Journal has the following: Mrs. W. D. Baker, 352 McLaren street, died Sunday after ailing for three or four years. She succumbed to a paralytic stroke. She was born in Quebec, but moved to Kingston thirty years ago and last October she came to Ottawa and resided with her son, R. D. Baker. She leaves a widow, two sons, R. D. Baker of Ottawa and W. J. Baker of Kingston. The funeral will be held Tuesday morning.

#### Late Sergt. James Codd.

Sergeant James Codd, for twenty-five years chief orderly at government house, Ottawa, is dead. In 1866 and 1867 he resided in Kingston and belonged to the 14th P.W.O. Rifles. He served at the time of the Fenian raids. While in Kingston, he married Miss Mary Burke, who survives him. Deceased leaves several sons and daughters.

#### To Run To Kingston.

It has been announced that the steamer Oicott of the Peninsula Steamboat company of Sandusky, O. will be operated out of Oswego, N.Y., this season, making trips to Kingston, Alexandria Bay and other Thousand Island points. The schedule calls for trips to Kingston on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Two C.P.R. trains of artillerymen, of which one was a double-header, left the city for camp Petawawa on Monday night. The 3th Kingston field battery left at nine o'clock and the Belleville unit a couple of hours later.

### A PRISONER OBJECTED

#### TO WEARING SHACKLES ON WAY TO THE PEN.

Joseph Musble, An Austrian, Sent Down from Windsor. Did Not Like the Idea of Wearing Them—But He Had To Submit.

It is not at all pleasant to wear shackles. Joseph Musble, who waits for his way to the penitentiary, and when he noticed a pair brought out at the police station on Tuesday morning, to be used on him, he immediately made an objection. His objection was noted, but counted for nothing, as Joseph, a prisoner, was found guilty of theft at Windsor, and sentenced to two years in the penitentiary. Two constables arrived with him on Monday night, and the prisoner was allowed to spend the night in the police cells. Musble is an Austrian, with very little love for this country, and if given any sort of a chance, would likely slip away as fast as he could. On this account, the men who had him in charge, did not care to take any chances.

"The poor man! Look at him shackled," a woman was heard to remark, as the prisoner was led out of the police station door to the cab which was in waiting. To the ordinary citizen, of course, it looked hard, but men of this stamp have to be treated in this way. If the man had made his escape, he would have been held responsible, and the first question which would have been asked by the public would have been, "Why did not the men in charge take every precaution to keep the prisoner?" One way of taking precaution was in using the shackles.

Although he objected to the shackles, Musble had no objection to smoking a good cigar, and as the cab was on its way out King street, the Austrian prisoner could be seen pulling away at his weed. It was the last he would receive for a time, and he made the best of it.

## DEAN OF NOVA SCOTIA.

To Preach at Consecration of Bishop-elect Bidwell.

The bishop of Salina, who was expected to preach the sermon at the consecration of the bishop-coadjutor, having been prevented from doing so by ill-health, his place will be taken by the Rev. J. P. D. Llewellyn, D. D., dean of Nova Scotia, and rector of All Saints' cathedral, Halifax.

The bishop-coadjutor-elect has appointed the Rev. W. F. Fitzgerald, M.A., vicar of St. Paul's church, to be his examining and domestic chaplain. The appointment is a tribute to the general ability and scholarship of the vicar of St. Paul's, who is a graduate of Trinity college, Dublin, and besides holding the Divinity Testimonial of that university, took honours in classics and literature in his arts course. He was also a Crowe exhibitioner in the divinity school.

## CATARAQUI CEMETERY.
