LAST OF OSWEGO FLEET.

Old Schooner Hoboken Sinks At Her Wharf At Ogdensburg.

Oswego Palladium. News comes from Ogdensburg of the sinking of the old schooner Hoboken, now owned by the Ogdensburg Coal and Towing company, on Tuesday. She was at the wharf when she gradually settled to the bottom and rats and bedbugs made their escape. For the past three years she has been out of commission, practically.

Time was when the Hoboken was one of the crack canal schooners of the Oswego fleet. She was built near Clayton in 1868 for a Detroit firm, but later came to Oswego and was owned for years by the late Captain Thomas Martin. Prior to that Captain C. W. Parker was interested in the schooner, which in the days of eighteen cent wheat from Chicago to Oswego was a regular mint. Like all the other schooners built at Clayton the Hoboken was a staunch craft. She was 129 feet long and twenty-six feet wide and was registered at 299 gross tons. In the days of her tri-umph she was handsomely fitted, the cabin being a particularly fine piece of work. The Hoboken is said to be the last of the old canal fleet famous the world over, and all notifying the world that they hailed from Oswego, N.Y.

THE MAIL SERVICE.

It Continues To Be A Scandal—Demanding Improvement.

Kingston continues to be on a back concession so far as the mail service between Kingston and American points is concerned. Spasmodically a bag of mail will be routed via Clayton in the morning while dribbles will come along in the afternoon. To-day no mail had arrived on the early boat. Merchants are growing irritable over the way the mail service is being handled and are demanding that satisfactory arrangements be concluded between the Canadian and American postal departments. It is scandalous that conditions have prevailed as they are at present for so long a time.

PORTER ARRESTED.

He Took Motor Boat Without Permission.

Alexandria Bay, N.Y., July 11.—Orin Porter, operator of the motor boat Frost King, which was sunk in a collision with the Sissina, near Hopedell Hall, Sunday evening, has been arrested on the charge of grand larceny. The arrest was on a warrant sworn out by Samuel Lawrence, a supervisor of George C. Boldt's estate, who accused Porter of taking out the Frost King on the fatal night without permission. Porter will be arraigned before Squire Charles A. Benson Friday morning at nine.

It is alleged that Porter had been commissioned to carry out a certain task and then to return to the Boldt estate. Porter finished what he had been sent to do but did not bring the boat back. Instead he took out a party of friends on a joy ride, which resulted in the accident of Sunday night. The charge is larceny second degree.

Whether Porter will ever be brought up on the more serious charge of manslaughter remains to be seen. The matter is in the authority of the state officials since the accident occurred on the river outside the jurisdiction of the town.
