**PASSED THE ENTRANCE**

**RESULTS OF THE RECENT EXAMINATIONS ANNOUNCED**

Alexander Givens Passed First, and Helen Wilton, and Arthur Penze Tied For Second Place.

Below will be found the names of the successful candidates at the recent high school entrance examinations in Kingston. There were 197 candidates, of whom 141 were successful, the largest number, probably, in the history of this examination in Kingston. The pupil taking first place was Alexander Givens, of the St. Mary's school. Master Givens, who is twelve years of age, obtained 590 marks. This is only one mark below the best record previously made. Next in rank come Helen Wilton, of Victoria school, and Arthur Penze, of Macdonald school, with 531 marks each. The two latter are cousins. Certificates have been mailed to the successful candidates and statements of marks obtained to the unsuccessful.

The conduct of the examination is regulated by the instructions of the department of education. The local examiners have only the powers conferred by these regulations. It may be noted that the claims of candidates who came near the standard for passing have already been carefully considered by the board, and in most cases the papers of such candidates have been re-read. It is therefore unlikely that an appeal from any unsuccessful candidate will be sustained.

**ODDFELLOWS DECORATE**

**GRAVES OF DEPARTED BRETHREN AT CATARAQUI**

On Sunday Morning—Sixty Members Took Part—Several Memorial Addresses Were Delivered.

Arniel, N.G., Cataraqui lodge, and the singing of the hymn, "Safe In The Arms of Jesus," the names of the deceased members of the order in Kingston were read. **THE TENTH DROWNING**

**IN KINGSTON HARBOR SINCE THE 1ST OF MAY**

John O'Reilly, Aged 16, Met Death. On Saturday Afternoon—His Brother Made a Gallant Attempt To Save Him.

The tenth drowning accident since May 1st occurred on Saturday afternoon, at about five o'clock, in the Rideau river, when John O'Reilly, aged sixteen years and six months, son of Arthur O'Reilly, Corrigan street, met death. The lad, in company with a number of chums, had been swimming in the vicinity of the K. & P. railway pier, when O'Reilly was taken with severe cramps, which caused him to go down. The younger brother, who was also in swimming, fell all in his power to bring his stricken brother to shore, but he sank never to rise, within a few feet of shore.

It is evident that O'Reilly knew that he was soon to sink as he told his brother who was trying to bring him to shore that he had better save himself, as there was no use of both drowning.

**DR. EDWARDS' ADDRESS**

What He Had To Say Before Toronto Orangemen.

Dr. J. W. Edwards, M.P.P. for Frontenac, was a speaker at the Orange demonstration in Toronto on Saturday and among other things he said:

We talk about civil and religious liberty. We have the former, but we have not got liberty if civil liberty means a square deal for everybody. Our Separate schools—have their taxes collected by the municipalities, they have their own inspectors, their own text books, and they teach what they please. Their readers are full of religious stories. They are taught a history which cuts out references to the Marian martyrs which magnifies the deeds of the enemies of England by referring to the Fenians as patriots. In many parts of Ontario under existing conditions Protestants have to send their children to Separate schools because they are the only schools in the district.

"Any Roman Catholic child can attend a public school without hearing one thing that would hurt his feelings. Can a Protestant child go to a Separate school and not be offended? Hardly. Have we got an established church? If a church receives money from the public treasury for the purpose of teaching its own doctrines, what is it? There is only one church in Canada like this. Do you wonder that these people tell us that when we are not married by a priest we are not married at all and that our children are illegitimate?"

"We proposed to give three Dreadnoughts to Britain and we were told by some people that we were putting ourselves under Downing Street. It was a monstrous thing to accept suggestions from the Admiralty. It would endanger our autonomy."

"The right for members of the house of commons and the Premier of Canada to invite the representative of the Pope to come over and supervise legislation. No danger of our autonomy there. It's wrong to take advice from Britain, but all right from the Pope."

"The boundary line of the French language as an official language must stop with the Ottawa River. Much has been said about the loyalty of the French-Canadians in the past. The basis of those laudations is absolutely rot. There's nothing to it."

"Dr. Edwards ran through much early Canadian history, the war of American Independence and the Quebec act."

"Whenever opposition to anything British has arisen in Canada it has come from the province of Quebec. The sentiment of the province of Quebec is anti-British if we are to judge them by the statements of their leaders."
