T. F. HARRISON WRITES

TO THE WHIG FROM GERMANY REGARDING KAISER'S DOMAINS

Kingston's Alderman, Now in Switzerland, Explains Berlin's Engineering Systems—Acme of Perfection Reached in Sewage Disposal.

Ald. T. F. Harrison writes as follows to the Whig from Zurich, Switzerland, on July 6th, regarding visit to Germany:

Strictly speaking, the old adage, "a rolling stone gathers no moss" is not true. A little of the green sticks and adds to the sum total; so, even in a rush ten-day trip in Germany, a little of the fuzziest of general information adheres.

It commences immediately on crossing the border from Russia, where, leaving the peaty-tilled farms of that despotically ruled country, you enter the neat, clean, productive fields of Dutch Land, where the utilization of waste material is at its best and nothing is lost.

But in their sewage disposal system the acme of perfection is reached. Berlin was surrounded by great sandy, non-productive areas, but to-day not only is the sewage satisfactorily removed, but through its utilization these great areas are made to not only blossom as the rose, but to be so productive that large sums are annually turned into the city treasury towards meeting an immense budget of forty million dollars.

Restoration is not the least of Germany's wise provisions for the future. On the drive to Potsdam there is a young forest of thirty-eight thousand acres of spruce and pine, and in every part of the empire great forests planted during the last twenty years are seen.

Conservation principles do not stop with the timber but all their legislation leads to the one objective—benefiting the people—and to such a degree has this operated, that in the last thirty years the death rate has decreased one-third and the population has increased over fifty per cent.

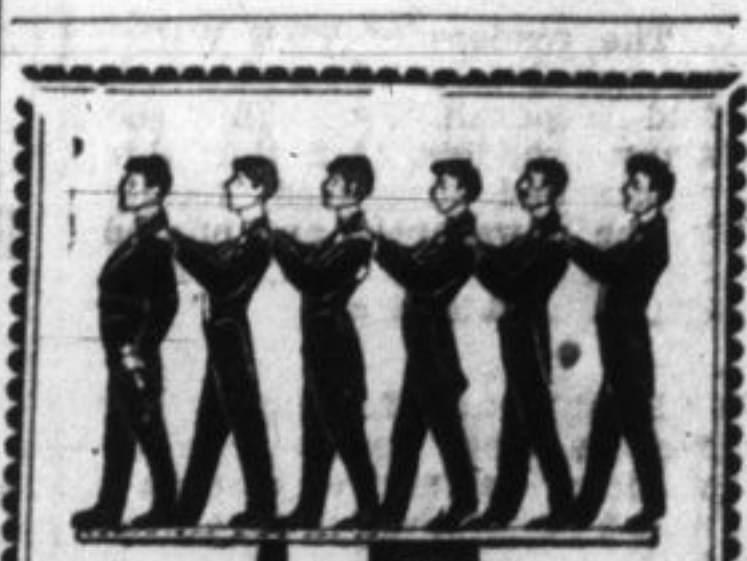
