**T. F. HARRISON WRITES**

**TO THE WHIG CONCERNING HIS TRIP THROUGH HOLLAND.**

The Unexpected Confronted at Markden—Kingston Alderman's Appreciation of Industry of Hollanders—Estimate Population by Counting Shoes on Doorsteps.  
 The Whig has received another letter from Ald. T. F. Harrison, this time regarding his stay in Holland. It is as follows:  
 In touring any country any traveller often sees the unusual and peculiar. Venice was both. The Rhine, dripping with centuries of fact and fiction was a surprise. But the real, unexpected, came on us at Markden, in Holland. We leave Amsterdam by boat for a few miles, then by train for a few miles, along the top of an ancient dyke, through a country guileless of hills, with scarce a roadway other than canals, narrow and wide, the former usually serving as farm divisions, and both as freight routes. We are constantly reminded that we are in Holland, the country of bulbs, Holstein cattle, dairying, windmills, and dykes, and though danger does not seem imminent, we can't help wondering if there is another little boy whose hand is ready to plug up any sudden leak, as in the story of our school days. These old Dutch windmills, thirty to fifty feet in diameter, are interesting, as they lazily obey their windy master, and pump the waters to higher levels, where they can gravitate to the 'Zuyder Zee' or in its spare time grind fodder for human and animal alike.

Leaving the train, a half hour's sail, and houses, fishermen's houses, primitive in design, and mastheads by the hundred, are seen, but the land, so low lying, only a foot or so above the tide level, is scarcely discernible, and one almost fears that a wave larger than usual, will wipe this little island of Markden and its thirteen hundred souls off the map. Walking the narrow, winding path the only foot thoroughfare—we are greeted by the curiosities of the island, dressed not after Kingston's fashion, but with a close-fitting head-dress, like the old-fashioned night caps, with a long curl reaching to the breast, in front of each ear, and more falling behind, a very tight waist, and extremely full skirts, the latter terribly abbreviated below the knees, giving full scope to expose the shoes, wooden ones. Japan and Korea have wooden foot-wear, but in Holland, and especially Markden, you see the real thing, for size and clumsiness. The whole dress is Jacobean in its color scheme, some of the colors indicating their social or family relationship. Everlybody works, including father, whose dress is just as much a surprise as the women's great baggy bloomers, drawn in at the knees, surmounted with the fisherman's smock and coarse peakless cap and great wooden shoes, complete the outfit. He swings the heavy old fashioned cradle; while the women finish the hay-making, leading it on smoo boots, and towing these along one canal after another, until the shipping dock is reached. No one is idle. The little girls early learn to knit, and on the door-step, dock and boat, the needles are steadily worked.

A census of the population can readily be taken at any time, by simply counting the shoes on the door steps, for, like the Japanese, they leave them there, together with the dust and dirt. There is a singular resemblance in features of this strange settlement, and fancy or fact, one can hardly escape.

**NEW UNIFORM ARRIVES**

**FOR THE ROYAL CANADIAN HORSE ARTILLERY.**

And Will Be Issued Next Week—The Uniform Will Give the Brigade a Very Striking Appearance.  
 The new horse artillery uniform and outfit for the local brigade has arrived, and will be issued to the men next week. As there doubtless will be alterations to be made, it may be a couple of weeks before the permanent men will be seen on parade in the ceremonial dress. Some of the officers have already worn the new uniform. The brigade promises to make a very "elaborate" appearance. The trimming of the officers' jackets is of gold, while that of the non-commissioned officers and men is yellow. A new head dress is also part of the new outfit. The new stables which have been built on the property north of Tete de Pont barracks, are nearly completed, and it is expected the horses of "B" battery, R.C.H.A., will occupy them soon. There are upwards of ninety horses in each battery. As the new stables only accommodate about sixty, the surplus horses of "A" battery will be kept at the driving shed, corner of Barrack and Wellington streets. The horses of "B" battery are accommodated at the Artillery Park stables, which battery is stationed at a board of officers will take over the new stables from the contractor, if satisfactory.
