

FOR THE ROYAL CANADIAN HORSE ARTILLERY.

And Will Be Issued Next Week-The Uniform Will Give the Brigade a Very Striking Appearance.

The new horse artillery uniform and outfit for the local brigade has arrived, and will be issued to the men next week. As there doubtless will be alterations to be made, it may be a couple of weeks before the permanent men will be seen on parade in the new ceremonial dress. Some of the officers have already worn the new uniform. The brigade promises to make a very "elaborate" appearance. The trimming of the officers' jackets is of gold, while that of the non-commissioned officers and men is yellow. A new head dress is also part of the new outlit. The new stables which have been
