EX-PRESIDENT TAFT DEFEATED AT GOLF BY F. W. BETTS.

Uniformity in Athletic Matters Between United States and Canada Urged—M.A.A.A. Wants Billington of McGill—Hendley Honors Divided Equally Between West and East.

Uniformity in athletic matters between the United States and Canada was the important matter discussed by G. W. Stumpf, chairman of the registration committee of the A.A.U., the United States governing body, and Walter Trivett, secretary of the Ontario Branch of the C.A.A., at a meeting held in Buffalo.

The Germantown Cricket Club's eleven made a brilliant showing against the Australian cricketers in the two-day match, which began in Philadelphia, Pa., on Wednesday.

The old question of payment for lost time by amateurs is again being discussed among footballers in the old country. At the present time rule 28 of the Football Association is very clear upon the point: "Any player receiving consideration of any sort above his necessary hotel and travelling expenses actually paid, shall be a professional."

The Toronto Cricket Club retain the Ross Robertson cup, emblematic of the Canadian cricket championship. They did not win, but held their opponents to a 215-all draw.

The annual international golf match of the Murray Bay Golf Club between Canada and the United States is being played at Pointe-a-la-Que. Special interest was added to this year's match by the fact that ex-President Taft was one of the players for his country.

When two lacrosse teams play eighty minutes overtime in three games before the question of supremacy is established, then it is a cinch that they are evenly matched and that any time those two teams hook up the contest should be worth going to see.

At Montreal, on Monday, August 11th, the second annual tournament of the Canadian Gold Professionals' Association will be held, and the entire promise to be larger than even last year. Nearly all the pros, east of

Winnipeg will compete, and the competition should bring forth all that these exponents of the creak and driver know of ever knew.

Rumors are travelling about the west that the major league moguls will be drawing up a baseball war before the opening of next season. It is said the Federal League plans an eastern invasion, also that the Baseball Players' Fraternity, which includes practically all big league players, will demand a number of changes in the present contracts between players and clubs.

Secretary J. H. Farrell, of the National Association of Baseball Leagues, has notified President McAleery, of Toronto, that Pitcher Herbert has been awarded to the Toronto club. Herbert was drafted by Toronto last fall from Ottawa and was turned over to Stratton on an optional agreement.

Kirley, the Toronto pitcher sent to Guelph on option, won the fourth game of the series from St. Thomas, on Wednesday, by a 5 to 2 not allowing the visitors a single hit. He swished like a veteran and had the Saints at his mercy, striking out ten of the railroad city batsmen.

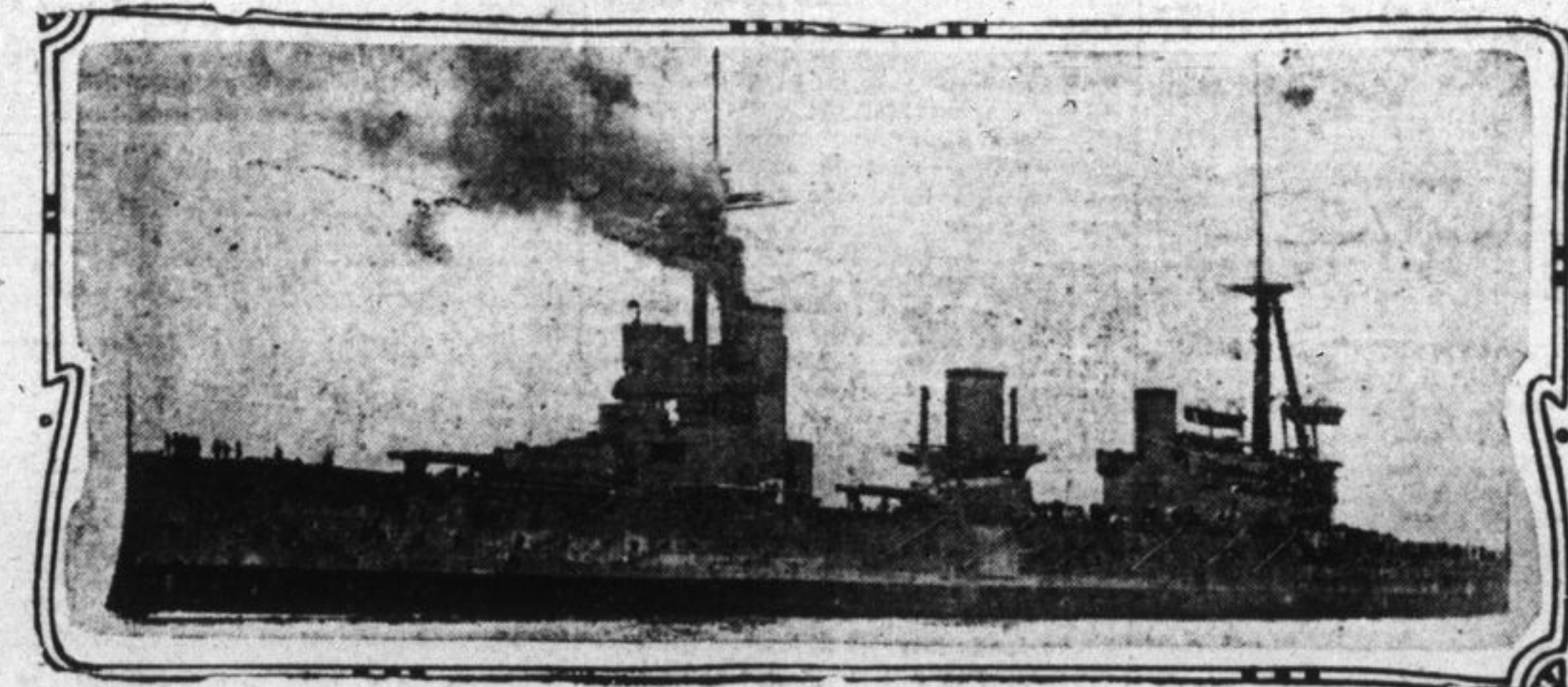

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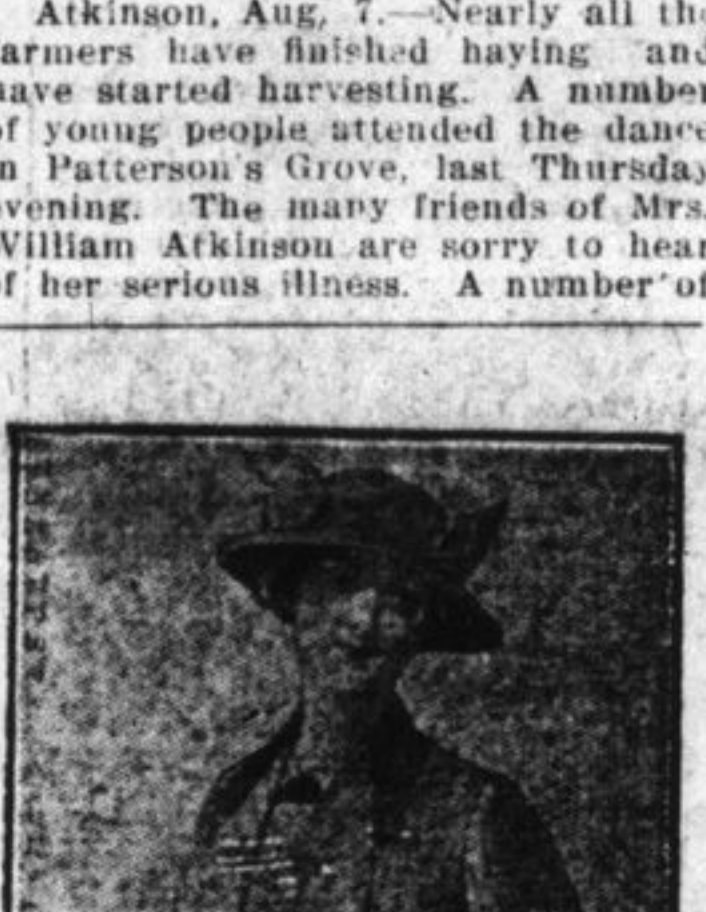
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AN EARLY FALL COSTUME

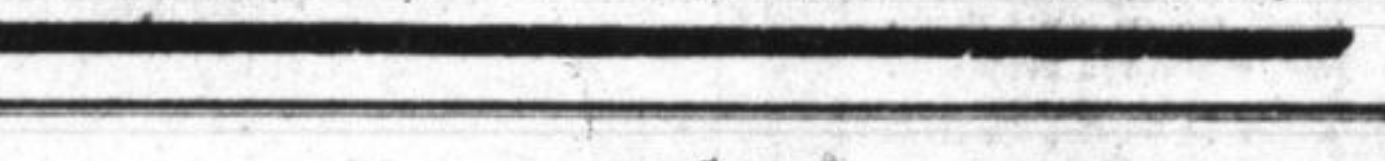
