The Man On Watch
If it is British justice to free a murderer and refuse the petition of the Women's Christian Temperance union for the release of a mother from the penitentiary, the Lampan thinks the sooner Canada is annexed to Mexico the better. It is not so long ago since Minister of Justice Doherty was prevailed upon to free a Canadian man who in cold blood (or hot blood if you wish), shot to death a drug clerk of Carp. On the pretence that the confeder of Cain had an ailment, the minister of justice could not free him any too soon. But the woman must serve her time in the prison! The honorable the minister of justice does not recognize the W.C.T.U.

Mayor Rigney is the only lawyer in the town council, and the councilmen depend upon him to interpret the law to them and guide them aright. For the benefit of the people going to the evening places of amusement, the ten-minute service should be continued an hour later—that is, until eight o'clock. U.S. AND SOUTH AFRICA.
Large Business Anticipated Between Them Under New Tariffs.
London, Sept. 13.—A Johannesburg despatch to the Daily Telegraph, referring to a visit of Mr. O'Dell, of the department of commerce at Washington, to inquire into the market openings for cotton goods in South Africa, says that Mr. O'Dell anticipates large business between the United States and South Africa, especially an increase of wool imports under the new tariff. A warning was issued to British merchants and manufacturers on the necessity of defending themselves unless they want to be left behind.

Left Several Millions.
Mineola, N.Y., Sept. 13.—The will of the late Oliver Livingston Jones, father of "General" Rosalie Jones, the suffragette leader, leaves an estate valued from \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000 to his widow. Dr. Jones shot himself with a pistol at his home in New York and died August 9th. Whether his death was due to an accident or suicide, has not been ascertained. The will was filed for probate yesterday.

BIG ROBBERY ON TRAIN
\$71,000 in Two Packages Mysteriously Disappear.
Savannah, Ga., Sept. 13.—Fifty thousand dollars in transit from the Chase National Bank of New York to the Savannah Bank and Trust company was stolen from a portable safe on an Atlantic Coast Line train between Jersey City and Savannah.
Another package containing \$21,900 from New York to banks in Valdosta and Brunswick also was taken from the same train. The safe, on the \$90,000 package seemed undisturbed when the robbery was discovered.

Murder By Filthy Milk Cans.
Montreal, Sept. 13.—"You are doing nothing less than murdering people by using such filthy milk cans as those just shown to the court. Such persons as you ought not to be allowed to keep a store for the sale of food to the public. You are a disgrace to your business, and you must expect no mercy when you are brought before me." This was the scathing comment passed by Recorder Semple when James Charle and Louis Chiquette were charged with having filthy milk cans in use. Both were heavily fined.

The Record Crop in West.
Winnipeg, Sept. 13.—The Free Press crop report, out to-day, estimates the wheat crop of the three provinces at 193,875,000 bushels, or 12,000,000 more than last year's harvest. The oats estimate is 208,205,000 bushels, barley 35,432,000 bushels, and flax 17,500,000 bushels.
