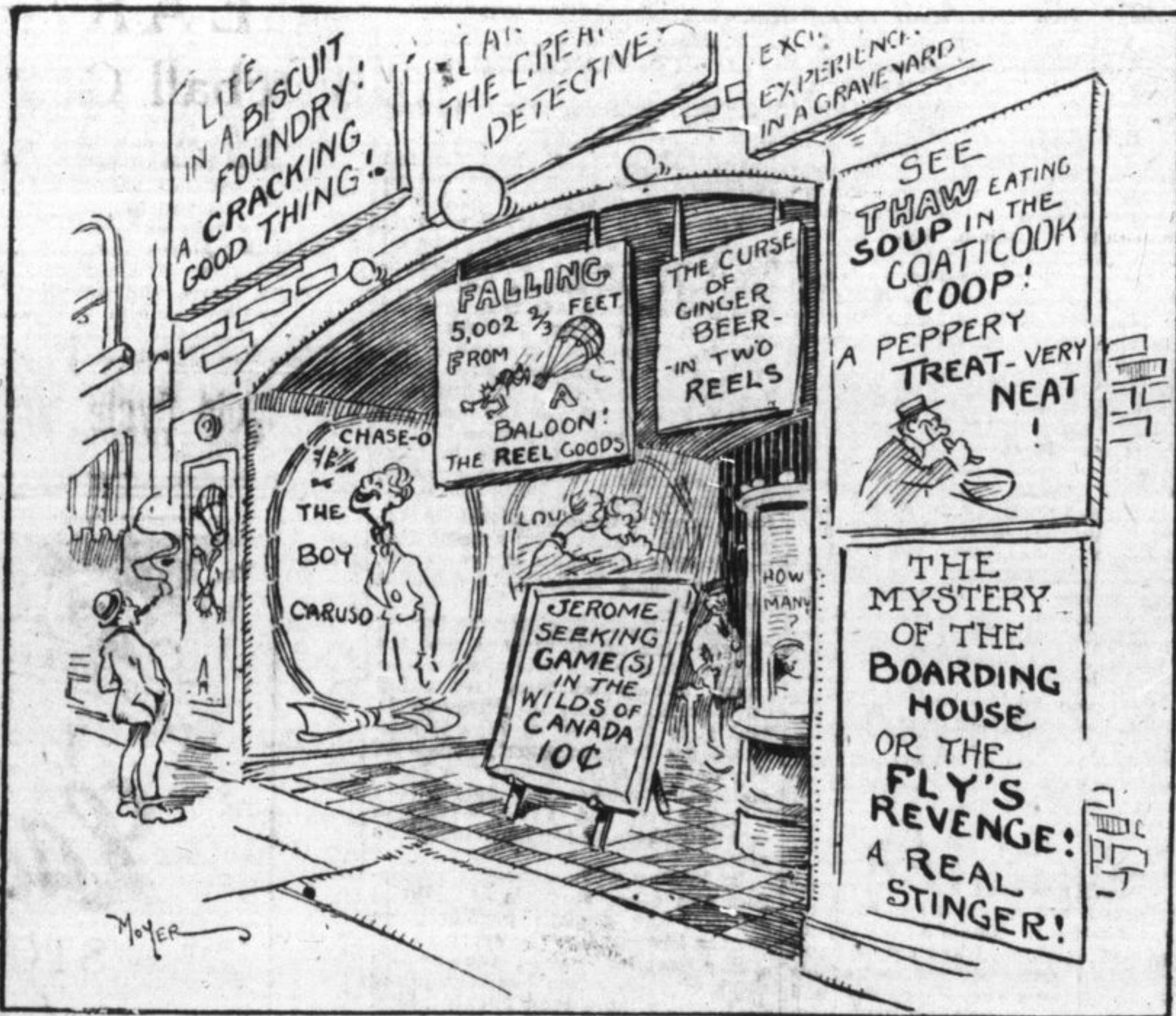

ENGLAND'S MODEL TOWNS.

House With Garden May Be Had Cheaply.

Considerable interest has been aroused among those who have been working for better housing and living conditions among the masses by the statement of Oscar S. Straus recently cabled from London on the value of co-operative garden city suburbs as they have been developed in various parts of England during the last few years, says the New York Times. Mr. Straus' remarks were based upon his visit with Earl Grey, the former governor general of Canada, to the model town of Hampstead, which, since its reorganization about seven years ago, has attained a remarkable success. "It is the best investment a city can make," said Mr. Straus, "and I intend to advocate it for New York on my return. It is easy to obtain large tracts in New Jersey and Long Island. Here London workmen pay from 75 cents to \$1.75 weekly for a house with a garden, and the colony pays interest of 4 1/2 per cent. If it can be done here, I believe it can be done in New York."

Since its organization Hampstead has perhaps attracted more attention from architects, builders, civic planning and housing improvement associations and kindred bodies than any other model town not even excepting the interesting experiments at Letchworth, about thirty-four miles from London, where considerable success has been achieved in the last twelve years in creating a model city. The interest aroused in Hampstead has undoubtedly been intensified by its accessibility to the heart of London. It is, in fact, a part of London, and can be reached by the 'tube' from Charing Cross station for a fare of twopence (4 cents) in from twenty-five to thirty minutes.

Under such exceptional conditions and with wise management, several hundred acres, which seven years ago were practically unused, have been transformed into a populous center of over 5,000 inhabitants, with railroads, motor busses, churches, schools, business blocks, parks and delightful gardens and over 1,000 houses.

The promoters of the scheme of which Earl Grey was one of the leaders, planned their model town on the idea of furnishing cheerful homes and opportunities for gardening and open-air recreations to a large number of the working class of London. For the same price that many of these working families have been paying for dingy tenement rooms in the close streets of the big city houses or small apartments in small houses may be obtained in Hampstead.

But it must not be understood that Hampstead is restricted to one class. Many acres were set aside for expensive homes and there are a large number of attractive residences renting from \$500 to \$1,500 a year. These are houses which are the equal of the majority of homes in our well-developed suburbs and where the rentals would be nearly twice as high.

While the organizing company known as the Hampstead Garden Suburb Trust has formulated a general plan of architecture and management which lends harmony and beauty to the whole, other interests, such as the Hampstead tenants' co-partnership society, has leased large acreage plots and built the homes. In the sections where more moderate prices prevail the group system of dwellings is a marked feature. In addition there are several buildings arranged as residential flats, where working women and aged persons may rent two or three rooms and yet have the advantage of a highly and pleasant home in a garden district.

Besides the gardens provided for each house there are tennis courts, bowling greens, and parks open to the public. Only eight houses are allowed to an acre, and by an act of parliament variations have been allowed in the width and construction of roads. A road not exceeding fifty feet in length and giving access to a group of houses may be as narrow as twenty feet provided the houses on either side are fifty feet apart. These groups are treated as an architect's unit. An English writer has said that it

CURES BY FLATHIONS.

Dr. Andia's Experiments Revive Oriental Tradition.

Medical as well as lay journals are commenting upon certain cures performed by Dr. Andia of Neuve Paillois in the department of the Indre, with no other apparatus than a flatiron, but, as one paper points out, a significant feature of the treatment is that the doctor uses red cloth, a color long used in the Orient as a supposed cure for certain diseases. A few months ago the doctor discovered the efficacy of the flatiron in destroying the bacilli of certain contaminated cloths and stuffs, and at once conceived the idea of ironing out patients afflicted in a similar manner. He first experimented with patients suffering from erysipelas. The patient's face, or the part of the skin to be treated, was covered with a red cloth, and the iron was heated to a temperature usually required to iron starched linen. The point of the iron was then run slowly along the edge of the skin affected by the disease as long as the patient could bear it. This process was repeated a number of times, the iron being raised when the patient felt himself unable to bear the heat. It was found that after a few applications the pain passed and the skin became less sensitive, the part treated becoming red and the blood vessels slightly dilated. After daily applications of the iron and red cloth for a week the patient was found to have entirely recovered. Dr. Andia has not attempted to explain the action of the red cloth, except to say that "the color helps the diffusion of the heat just as a sieve does water."
