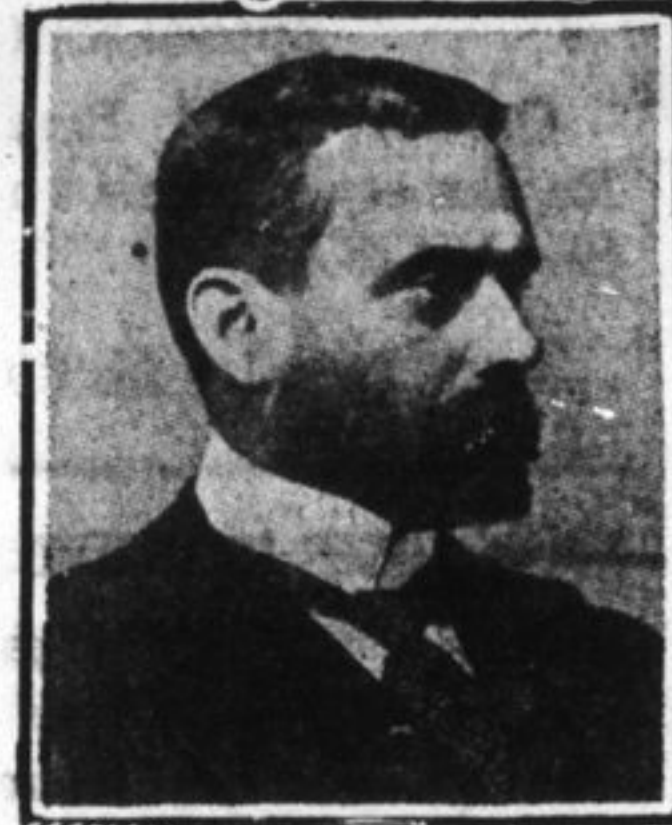

## SIR GILBERT PARKER

SPEAKS ABOUT THE GREAT FIELD OF CANADA

He Would Like British and Canadian Governments To Co-operate In The Way of Organizing Immigration.

Winnipeg, Sept. 22.—"Canada must be, for many years, the most attractive field for the immigrant," said Sir Gilbert Parker, novelist, and member for Gravesend in the British house of parliament, "and," he continued, "I should like to see, if it must be, immigration from the United Kingdom distributed over all portions of the king's dominions, which need farmers, artisans and laborers. "But Canada, because it has become covered with a network of railways which facilitates internal transport so prodigiously, by its increasing population, by its constant yearly surplus in the treasury, and above all by its nearness to Great Britain, offers a field with which no other dominion can successfully compete. "I should like to see, as I have pointed out in the British parliament for years, the British government co-operate with the Canadian government, in organizing immigration and making special provision that the best class of English settlers like the ex-army, ex-navy and ex-volunteer soldier and sailor, could settle where they would be of most service to the empire in any time of danger. British Columbia, for instance, must forever

be a strategic territory for any possible operations in time of war. "War is a thing which every sane man abhors, but which no sane and loyal man will shirk when the integrity of the nation is in peril. Therefore Canada, though she build up her industries and absorb great populations from below the forty-ninth parallel of latitude, from Europe or from the British Isles, must remember that the world is not to be civilized and peace-loving as the component nations of the British empire, and when any portion of that empire is at war, whether it be England or Australia, or New Zealand, or Canada, the empire is at war, though none may be compelled to take part in the war unless they please."

### DEATHS AFTER SCANDAL

Eight Persons Killed Themselves. Fourteen Arrests Made. Berlin, Sept. 23.—A dozen or more sudden deaths of prominent citizens of Breslau in the last few days have led to the discovery that at least eight of these persons killed themselves to avoid disclosures affecting their private lives. They were involved in a common scandal. Fourteen arrests have been made and the city is stirred by the revelations. A number of doctors and dentists, a wholesale baker, a swimming teacher and a retired police official are among those accused, and who either have committed suicide or have been taken into custody. Seventy-five girls, some of them under fourteen, figure in the case, and it is alleged by the police that the parents of a number of the girls encouraged the festivities, which took place nightly in certain private residences. The scandal was mainly centred in the suburb of Ohlau, where the police got wind of it a few days ago. Fourteen arrests were made and a large number of pictures were seized at an establishment of a druggist. Numerous other arrests have since been effected. The number of girls concerned is stated to be seventy-two. Among the men arrested are an officer, a retired police lieutenant, a baker, an owner of a hotel, a builder, a confectioner and the owner of the public bath.

## CONTRACTS AWARDED

FOR SUPPLYING AND LAYING DUCT FOR CONDUITS

To the Dietrich Company, Limited, of Montreal, Whose Tenders For Both Were Lowest—The Work To Be Started Next Week—Companies To Co-operate With City.

At a special meeting of the Utilities committee on Monday afternoon, the contract for supplying and laying 5,000 feet of duct on Princess and King streets, was awarded to the Dietrich company, limited, Montreal, on the recommendation of A. G. Lang, Hydro-electric commission engineer, and C. C. Folger, general manager of the Civic Utilities. The figure of this company for laying the duct was \$11,887, as compared to \$12,585, of Campbell & Wright, of Kingston. The price for duct was six cents a foot. Square duct was recommended for this work. The Dietrich company has done a great deal of this work throughout the country, and guarantee to complete the work on scheduled time.

The contract has to be ratified by the city council at its meeting next Monday evening, and the work of installation will start immediately afterwards.

The telephone and the telegraph companies will be notified of the city's intention to lay conduits on Princess and King streets, and asked to co-operate in getting rid of the poles and overhead wires. These thoroughfares in preparation for paving. These companies, it is understood, are only too willing and are also ready to put their wires underground. They will pay the city certain sums for the use of the conduits about to be constructed. In attendance at the Utilities committee were Aids. Ross (chairman), Hoag, Harrison, Litton and Sutherland.
