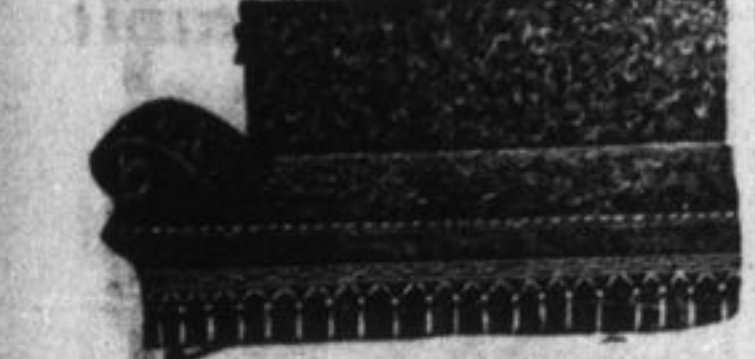
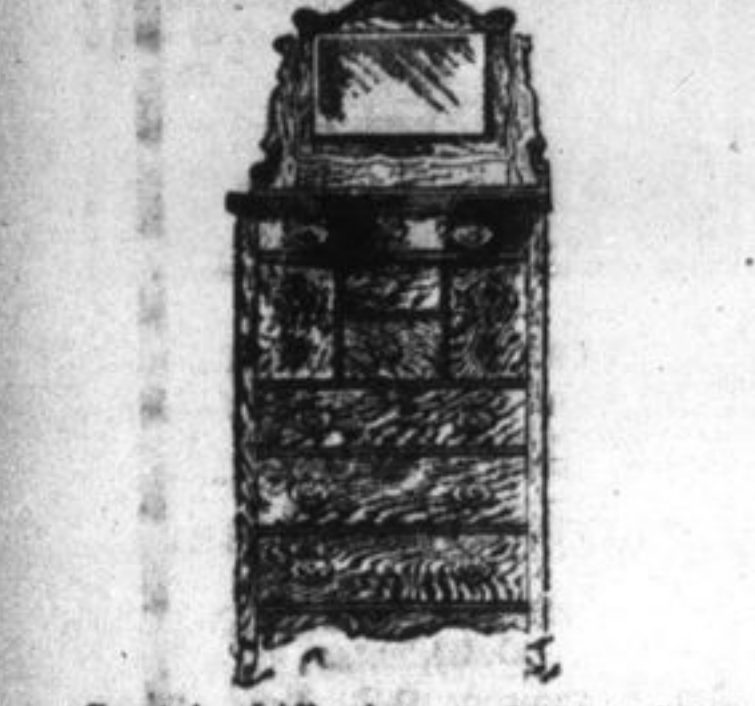

Practices are to be held every afternoon, commencing at four o'clock. By the end of the week it is expected that the majority of the players will be back.

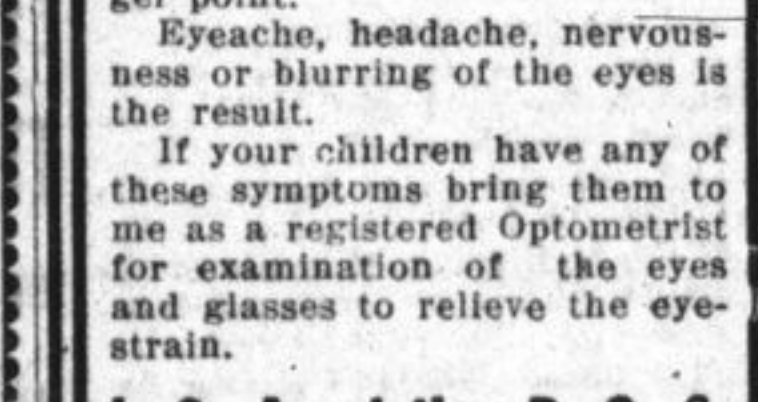
**Queen's Soccer Team.**

**China and the East.**

A wonderful panorama greets the traveller approaching Hong Kong. **HAD TO PAY A FINE**

**FOR KEEPING PREMISES IN UNSANITARY CONDITION**

William McCammon, Sanitary Inspector, Had Citizen in the Police Court, On Wednesday Morning.  
For keeping his premises in an unsanitary condition, Harry Webber, living at 211 Prince street, was fined \$5 and costs, with the option of fifteen days in jail, at the police court, on Wednesday morning. The magistrate is certainly out with a big stick after all who violate the sanitary by-laws.  
William McCammon, the sanitary inspector, was the complainant in this case. He said that on the complaint of neighbors, he had visited Mr. Webber's place, and characterized the premises as being "very unsanitary." He told the magistrate that Webber was engaged in making tallow, and that the premises were in a very bad condition.  
"Better quit this work," said the magistrate in imposing a fine on Webber. "If you continue, you will be summoned to the police court again."  
When Patrick Keenan was charged with being drunk, the magistrate stated that it was only a short time since he had been up before, so he imposed a fine of \$2 and costs or twenty days.  
Henry Smith, "also drunk" was given a similar fine, as he too, was no stranger to the court.
