Working of City Laborers Ten Hours a Day.

Kingston, Oct. 16.—(To the Editor): I notice that the city laborers are still kept at work ten hours a day, while a motion is in force providing for a nine-hour workday for all city laborers. It seems to me that the mayor and aldermen of this city have very little conception of their duty when they will allow the manager of a department and one or two members of the council to override a resolution of the City Council. If they think the nine-hour resolution should not be enforced, why are they not more courageous to rescind it in open council and let the electors know where they stand on the question, instead of quietly conniving at its breach.

I know it is claimed that men cannot be obtained to work the nine-hour day, but men who are in the employment of the city tell me that any number of men could be got to work the nine-hour day. This, of course, would not suit the interested parties who desire to flood the city with men so as to keep down the wage rate, and let these same men are willing to sell their services or goods at the very highest price possible—By order Trades and Labor Council, W.
