SEEKS CELL IN EUROPE

Commissionary Wants To Study Foreign Penal Institutions
Auburn, N.Y., Nov. 5.—Believing an examination of European penal institutions will afford him a broader outlook in criminology, Thomas Mott Osborne, millionaire philanthropist and head of the Prison Reform Commission of New York state, will sail with in a fortnight for Europe.
Mr. Osborne, who recently served a self-inflicted term of one week in Auburn prison, will spend a term of similar length in at least one of the European penal institutions, providing permission can be obtained from the authorities there, for the purpose of comparing the prison conditions in New York state and abroad.

NEED MORE GOLD RESERVE

British Banker Urges Increasing Country's Holdings.
London, Nov. 5.—Lecturing to the students of the Birmingham School of Commerce last night on theory and practice in banking, Sir Edward Holden, Bart., drew attention to the manner in which new countries, especially Canada, have had to supplement the exports of goods by borrowing capital abroad. Imports in such countries as Canada and the Argentine, especially the former, had been on such a large scale in recent years that there had been an adverse trade balance against those countries which had to be filled up. He also dealt with gold reserves, urging the holding of larger reserves in England. He remarked that the first lord of the admiralty provided yearly increases in expenditure for ships, and the minister of war on the army, but no attempt had been made by the Chancellor of the Exchequer to provide the gold necessary for operating these two services in case of an emergency.
