Lord Halsbury Says His Majesty Cannot Object.

## PREROGATIVE OF KING

HAS BEEN ABOLISHED FOR HUN-DREDS OF YEARS

His Lordship Asks If His Majesty Is To Be Allowed To Exercise His Own Judgment-Hon. Mr. Pease Thinks King Will Sign the Bill.

London, Nov. 7.-How deeply the Irish question cuts into British public life was further illustrated by speech of Lord Halsbury, who, as lord chancellor, was for twenty years the keeper of the conscience of both Queen Victoria and King Edward. Like his successor in the chancellorship, Lord Loreburn, whose letter for the Times of Sept. 11 created the present acute phase in the Irish crisis, Lord Halsbury is supremely concerned by the embarrassing position in which the Home Rule question must place sovereign unless speedily settled consent, hence what the ministerial papers call his amazing outburst at Chelsea on Wednesday.

He said : "Under the Parliament Act responsibility is with the crown. Is His Majesty to be allowed to exercise his judgement? Is he to be entitled to say 'No.' This is again the interests of my country which I am called upon to govern. I must do my duty
