score of men had to labor for hours next day ere it could be cleared. Nevertheless, that which they regarded as a misfortune was a blessing. **ARMY IS REAL THING**  
 IT IS SAID MILITANTS MAY BE SIEGE WESTMINSTER  
 Idea Is To Recruit a Force Sufficient To Outnumber Police and Impose Cabinet Ministers in Their Residences.  
 London, Nov. 20.—Miss Zelle Emerson, the leading American suffragette in London, who is in charge of the East London division, says: "Our suffrage army is progressing rapidly towards success. The object of the army is to protect militants from the brutality of the police, who during the last month have been ordered by the authorities to 'make no arrests, but inflict as many bodily injuries as possible.' "The army will be composed of men and women who will be drilled separately in the use of clubs, fists and ju-jitsu by volunteer instructors skilled in such matters. "Sir Francis Vane, who is in command of the army, proposes to divide the force into units of twenty-five militants, each squad to be in charge of a capable lieutenant. "Strange to say, there is a larger number of men in our ranks than of women. Hundreds of volunteers offered their services from the inception of the movement, many of them trained fighters who have seen service in the regular British army or militia here. "We hope the army will be thoroughly trained and equipped for action before the opening of parliament in February. It is then that we expect to have most need of its services, when beleaguering the house of lords and the house of commons and attacking members of the British ministry.

"If we can recruit our ranks so as to outnumber the police three to one in any crisis, we can accomplish much effective work, and we may even be successful in imprisoning the members of the cabinet in their homes before we are through. "If we could do that, it would be a great feather in our cap and probably arouse such popular interest that the lethargic Britishers, who control the votes now, would be forced to take stringent action, which probably, would favor our movement."

 Colebrooke, Nov. 20.—The bazaar, fowl supper and concert given by the Ladies' Aid of Colebrooke Methodist church, on Nov. 11th and 12th, was a grand success. Messrs.
