### RETAIL MERCHANTS' VARSITY WON DEBATE

#### TALK OVER A COMMISSION FOR THE UTILITIES.

They Want An Explanation As To Why Manager Folger is Changing Direct Current to Alternating.

Informal discussion by a number of retail merchants assembled in the Board of Trade rooms, on Thursday evening, threw the searchlight on many of the things in which they are interested, and which will be taken up at the adjourned annual meeting next Tuesday evening.

For one thing they will follow closely the proposal to elect a commission to conduct the business of the city utilities. It was estimated by one Princess street merchant that a man who would be sure to be in the running for this board had to begin with "a staggerer." His attitude on more than one occasion has, in a sense, "ruled" some of the merchants.

Of course, the kind of pavement to be laid on Princess and King streets next year is to be discussed. Scores of the retailers are somewhat annoyed over a change which has been made in the electric current, entailing, in many cases, considerable expense to the merchants.

C. C. Folger, the manager of utilities, will be asked to present and give an explanation of the change from the direct to the alternating current on Princess street, which has necessitated citizens changing motors. One reason given for this is that the department is preparing for the Hydro.

The question was asked whether the retailers were going to put candidates in the field for aldermanic honors for next year's council, and a tribute was paid to Ald. T. F. Harrison.

#### HAD A STORMY PASSAGE.

### Steam Barge Jeska Made Her Last Trip Over the Lake.

The steam barge Jeska made her last trip over the lake from Oswego, on Thursday, coal-laden, for Robert Crawford, and had a very stormy passage.

The schooners Julia B. Merriam and Ford River are loading coal for Kibson, but on account of the fair wind it was feared that the vessels would not get over today.

The steamer Phelps was in port on Thursday night from Oswego, and went over to Wolfe Island to discharge coal.

The steamer Donna-onns arrived in port from Montreal, and loaded pressed hay for Fort William.

M. T. Co.'s elevator: Steamers Windsor and Rosemount, from Montreal, to go into winter quarters; the Thompson, from Montreal, in last barges; the Emerson due up to-morrow with three light barges; steamer Keyport, from Port Colborne, discharging grain; steamer Atlantic from Montreal to lay up.

The steamer Geronia was towed by the tug Frontenac from Port South to Garden Island on Friday, where the smoke stack was lifted out preparatory to the changing of her boilers at the Shipyard wharves.

The steamer Sarnon was at Swift's on Friday morning on her way from Montreal to Cleveland.

#### MISS MACHAR'S VIEWS.

### She Writes on Suffrage Issue in Montreal Herald.

"I certainly do recognize in the gradual enfranchisement of women--which is a marked feature of our age--an important step in the evolution of society. We can easily see in the gradual evolution of human society in the past, the causes responsible for the long-existing disabilities and subordination of womanhood, and there is no doubt that this condition has often led to tyranny on the one hand and suffering from oppression on the other, neither of these being conducive to the development of noble manhood or womanhood. Now, however, a more comprehensive and a truer ideal of freedom is abroad, and in country after country, even in those we have considered the least progressive--such as China and Turkey--women are more and more making good their claim to stand side by side with men as true partners in all that concerns the good of the state and the community, which is essential to the good of the home itself."

#### Opening of Tea Rooms.
