TREATMENT OF INSANE IN THE PENITENTIARY.

(Continued from Page 3.) any public institution, it is essential to the interests of all concerned, that a complete and systematic record of each day's occurrences should be preserved.

System of Identification.

A proper system for the identification of the insane requires a thorough examination of each convict on admission. This examination should embrace two sets of conditions, those bearing on the convict's previous history and those bearing on his present state. The information respecting the former in some cases would be difficult to secure, but as full records as possible should be obtained of the family and personal history. The examination on admission should follow the usual conventions which obtain in the hospitals for the insane in Ontario, dividing the examination into two parts, one dealing with the physical and the other with the mental condition. The physical examination, which should be made immediately after the convict is received at the prison serves several purposes, (a) it gives an opportunity for the detection of infectious or other physical diseases, which would require to be dealt with immediately; (b) it protects the institution from unjust charges, by discovering any evidence of injury or ill-treatment received previous to admission; (c) it supplies data for subsequent identification in case of escape; (d) it affords information as to the nature and amount of work which may be demanded.

The mental examination is necessary to detect insanity and to obviate such familiarity with the mental state of the individual as will enable the warden to place him under conditions most favorable for his reformation and profitable employment. In this way cases which are not amenable to prison discipline, by reason of mental unsoundness, would be weeded out before they had an opportunity of breaking the rules and incurring punishment. Convicts should also be examined at regular intervals, to ascertain whether there has been any change in their mental condition, these subsequent examinations being more frequent during the early part of their confinement than later, and full reports of the examination on admission and also the subsequent observations should be filed in the warden's office, the medical records being kept separate from the ordinary files of the prison. In this way the warden and other lay officers would be kept informed as to the mental condition of the convicts and thus it would be possible to abolish this antiquated practice of punishing the insane.

Commission to Decide.

In conclusion I leave it to the commission to decide whether the faults which I have indicated are due to defects of administration, or to the personnel of the staff. I may say, however, that so long as the insane remain within the prison they must be subjected to the general rigid discipline which is required to prevent escapes and other untoward incidents; and any institution which undertakes to adequately care for the insane in an unsuitable building, located within the walls of the prison, without a properly trained staff of attendants, and without a resident medical officer, is assuming a grave responsibility.

Dr. Young made the further statement that guards admitted "tubing" convicts in the insane ward, but that he stated that this was the only way they had of showing their authority over the men. This method, said the doctor, is not the right one to take with insane convicts, as it tends to make them worse. He did not think the guards would punish these convicts if they knew the harm. Punishment in the dungeon was too severe.

After Dr. Young's evidence, the commission adjourned until next Wednesday at 10 a.m. The evidence of the deputy warden and the surgeon has to be taken, and it is also announced that the two prison inspectors will be examined.

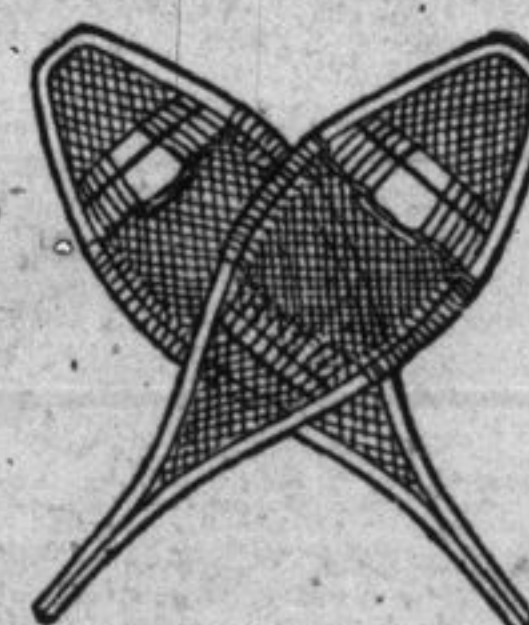
