The mental examination is necessary to detect insanity, and to obtain such familiarity with the mental state of the judividual as will enable the warden to place him under conditions most favorable for his reformation and profitable employment. In this way cases which are not amouable to prison discipline, by reason of mental unsoundness, would be weeded out before they had an opportunity of breaking the rules and incurring punishment. 
