NAPANEE RIVER DAMS

Removal of Dams on Depot Stream Would Be a Blessing—When River-driving Ceased, Did Rights Revert to the Crown? Reynolds, Dec. 30.—(To the editor): To remove the dams from the Depot stream would be a blessing to the settlers of Hinchinbrooke. Benjamin, of Yarker, tries to make out that they have a perfect right to flood the land in Hinchinbrooke. All the right they have they got from the Rathbun Company. The Rathbun Company got the land for river-driving purposes. They built dams and slides to get their logs down to their mills. The Rathbun Company was a great benefit to the settlers of Hinchinbrooke. They gave employment to men and teams for a great number of years and just as soon as the ice went out of the locks in the spring, they commenced running their logs down to the mills. By the time they got their logs down the river, the water in the back lakes was so low that the settlers could go on their land and cut hay for their cattle. Now the Rathbun Company has no more timber to take down the stream. They sell what right they have to the Niagara River Improvement Company. Now "don't" think the Rathbun Company had any right to the stream when they had no more use for it. The right belongs to the Crown.

Stratford's New Lighting Rates. Stratford, Dec. 31.—Beginning with the new year a new schedule of lighting rates will go into effect, the rate for house lighting, which is now four cents per 100 square feet of floor space, plus 4c. per kilowatt, being reduced to 4c. a kilowatt. In commercial lighting, the new charges will be eight cents per kilowatt hour for the first thirty hrs. and four cents per hour in excess.
