Very few cases of tuberculosis in either children or grown persons have been traced to milk, and even in these it has been a question whather the cow was tuburcular. by virtue of his office, be the chair-Ourbreaks of typhoid fever and dyphtheria have been forced to milk frequently, but the germs of these diseases have always been introduced into the milk after it left the cow. It is possible that children fed on sterilized milk exclusively would come weakened and subject to tuberculosis because the nutritive value of the food had been destroyed. This is a knock at pasteurization and sterilization. Both can be conducted with beneficial results, under trained scientists, but heating without dis crimination is destructive of the nutrition in the milk, and this fact should not be ignored.


