There have been cases where a president has refused to accept his election, on account of the extent of the opposition, and in 1881 Fridolin Anderwert was so distressed by the relatively small tmajority by which he had been elected, interpreting the adverse vote as a lack of confidence in his integrity and capacity, that he mitted suicide on the very eve of the ment of what was to peen his term of office.

ALASKAN VOLCANOES.

Than at First Believed.

The tremendous outburst of Mount Katmai in Alaska last year is now known to have been one of the greatest volcano eruptions of historic times. The eruption of this mountain unquestionably constitutes Alaska a land of volcanic activity of the first magnitude. Only because of the extreme scarcity of the population did the eruption escape being a disaster which would have shocked the civilized world. Yet little has been said about this terrific convulsion of nature, which, it is estimated, blew between 12 and 15 thundred billion tons of material into the

June 6, without warning, the Katmai volcano proclaimed itself by a frightful explosion, the sound of the mighty bombardment carrying as far as Juneau, 750 miles distant, and even across the towering Alaska the far interior of the peninsula. Following this came a huge column of steam and ashes which rose to a height of over four miles and was of pumice over the whole east half of Alaska peninsula, and most of Kodiah and Afognak Islands. Intense darkness accompanied the fall of ashes. Midnight blackness at noon extended as far east as Kenai peninsula, 200 miles distant. Volcanic dust fell at points 1,000

It seems incredible that no person was directly killed by the eruption of Mount Katmai. Had the convulsion been that of Vesuvius or Etna, in Italy, or Asamayama, Japan, or many other active volcanoes, the loss of life would probably have been in the tens of thousands. Very likely it will be years before this volcano can generate enough force for another eruption of equal severity, which is a reassuring thought.

> Prehistoric Relies From Africa. Central Africa was once the home of a highly civilized people. The latest proof of this comes from Leo Probenius, a German explorer, who collected and brought back to Berlin recently many specimens of ancient art. Much of this material is not older than the sixth century after Christ, but the various objects were found in the ruins of places from 15 to 25 feet below the surface, and these buildings had been built the ruins of still older and more pretentious structures. The latter were of solid, well built masonry with court yards and gardens surmounted by roofs of tiles.

Some of the finest specimens statuary and bas reliefs in bronze, terra, cotta and carved quartz come from these prehistoric ruins. They rival in perfection of workmanship the best relies of ancient Egypt, thus proving that in very remaie ages Central Africa must have been inhabited by a highly civilized people, and supporting the theory that Africa was the seat of the first high civilization which was transmitted across the Mediterranean to Turope, while the peoples who had founded it sank gradually into a condition of savagery, through what cause we can only conjecture.
