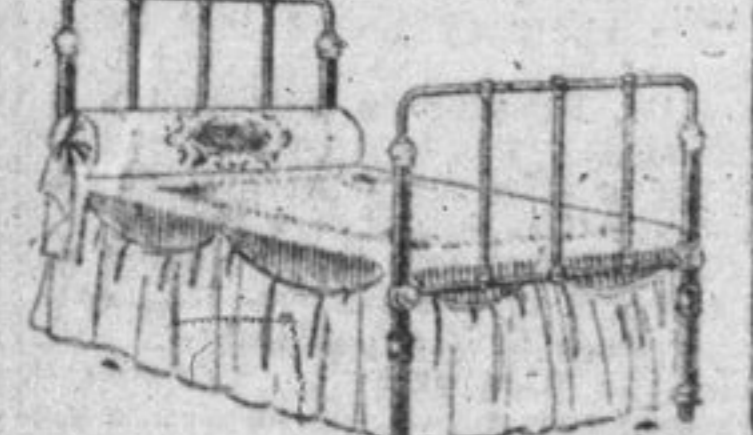

The report of the committee of management stated that the holiday season was made very pleasant for the patients, besides the usual hospital Christmas and New Year dinners, many donations of fruit, candies, etc., were received, and the tea given by the Victoria Circle of King's Daughters was much enjoyed.

The governors expressed their appreciation of the kindness shown by the many friends of the hospital who responded so generously to the Christmas appeal, acknowledgment of which will be made in the daily papers in a few days.

The financial statement for the first three months of the year was submitted and considered satisfactory.

The new wing is now nearly completed and the building committee was asked to take charge of the arrangements for the formal opening.

George Mills, having qualified, was appointed a governor of the hospital, and, with Dr. A. F. Chown, will be the visiting governors for the present month.

The purchases by the association during the year totalled about \$200,000, and the interest averaged 5 1/2 per cent.
