NOVA SCOTIA ALLURING Dr. Michael Clark Regrets He Did Not Stay Here. Sydney, N.S., Jan. 5.—"I am sorry I did not stay in Nova Scotia instead of going west," Dr. Michael Clark, of Red Deer, asserted in an interview. "I believe I could come to Nova Scotia and make as great a success of farming here as in western Canada. Your country is much like the lowlands of Scotland." The doctor, too, was pleased with the open-hearted way the people of Cape Breton have provided for his hospitality. "Talk of the hospitality of the highlands of Scotland," said Dr. Clark, "your people here have improved on it by twenty-five per cent." Dr. Clark has just come from Antigonish, where, as he himself said, he had addressed one of the most delightful audiences he had ever seen gathered together in Canada. "The balcony was filled with beautiful women and the main hall was packed with the men of the place, who, though they did not enthrone wildly, listened to the address with strict attention, and I realize that I had a critical audience to talk to. London, January 6.—A semi-official promise is given, says the Berlin correspondent of the Sunday Times, that an Anglo-German agreement will be given publicity soon. ing, but when the time comes that she is willing to sell, Britain and Germany will acquire by an arrangement made at the time of the Boer war.

This opinion conflicts with the story of the New York Times, which stated that the Portuguese colonies were changing hands. It is well known, however, that Germany has every reason for the wish to acquire Mozambique, as Germany East Africa, higher up the coast is an expensive and unhealthy colony, a graveyard full of some promising young men. Its South West colony, adjoining Cape Colony, is also an arid desert peopled by savages.

On the other hand, British commerce has long held sway through Mozambique, while a railway from Johannesburg, to Lorenzo Marques provides admirable transport opportunities for the golden city.
